REDLANDS LOCALS CAN GET HELP WITH VINNES HOME ASSIST SECURE

If you are over 60 or have a disability and live in the Redlands, Vinnies may be able to help you stay safe and secure in your home through its Home Assist Secure program.

Home Assist Secure Redlands Program Coordinator said that the service assists with everyday tasks in and around the home which may be difficult for people to undertake safely themselves as technical expertise is required

If eligible you may receive a financial contribution towards labour costs for minor home maintenance relating to your health and safety or security

You can be confident about the tradespeople doing the work as we only engage reputable tradespeople who meet the legislative requirements to undertake the work.

The program is funded by the Queensland Government and administered by the Department of Housing and Public Works and provides safety related information, referrals and subsidised assistance to eligible Queenslanders who are unable to pay for or undertake maintenance services to their home.

Eligibility may also depend on whether a person is able to make use of alternative forms of assistance such as Commonwealth Home Support Program, Queensland Community Care Services or DVA.




WHAT IS DEMENTIA?

Dementia is not a normal form of ageing, but a disease of the brain that can affect memory, thinking and behaviour, and the ability to perform every day tasks. The symptoms of dementia can be caused by a variety of diseases, including Alzheimer's disease, frontotemporal dementia, vascular dementia, dementia with Lewy Bodies, younger onset dementia and many others.

Dementia interacts with the person, their personality, their strengths and weaknesses and thereby will affect people in different ways. Dementia is progressive and so that means that over time things will change and so there is that progressive decline in functioning.

Alzheimer's disease is the most common type of dementia and will typically start slowly with subtle symptoms, such as short term memory loss, a sense of confusion or orientation, forgetting parts of a recent conversation, forgetting important dates etc., but for many people memories from years ago remain strong. If you are concerned about yourself or someone you know who are experiencing symptoms of memory loss, confusion or disorientation, it is important to have a conversation with your doctor. Memory loss and changes to someone's thinking or behaviour can be caused by various other conditions and may not be caused by dementia. If the changes are being caused by dementia, finding out early can help a person, their carer and family, understand what is happening and why. The person with dementia can make timely decisions about planning the future and also access support services to help them stay living independently at home. It is important for them to know where to access important services, such as the National Dementia helpline on 1800 100 500, Monday - Friday from 9am to 5pm. It is a free, confidential service that provides support and access to counsellors, who can help the person living with dementia, their carers and family, manage the impact of dementia.



WAR WIDOW(ERS) AND ORPHAN PENSION

WHO IS ELIGIBLE

These are pensions that are paid under the VEA to compensate widowed partners and dependent children of veterans who have died as a result of war service or eligible defence service. War widow(er)'s pension and orphan's pension are not affected by other income, except from other compensation payments.

WHO CAN CLAIM

The following people can claim this pension:

- a widow or widower a person who was legally married to, or was in a de facto relationship with, an Australian veteran immediately before the veteran's death and has not since remarried, married or entered into a de facto relationship with another person; or
- a dependent child the natural or adopted child of a veteran, or a child who was wholly or substantially dependent on the veteran. The child must be under 16 years, or under 25 years and still undertaking full-time studies. Orphan's pension may not be payable if the child is aged 16 years or over and is in receipt of Commonwealth educational assistance through Youth Allowance; Assistance for Isolated Children Scheme; ABSTUDY; Post-Graduate Awards Scheme; or the Veteran's Children Education Scheme.

HOW DO I KNOW

If the veteran has operational service or has a declared service they will be eligible. To understand who may be qualified you can read Fact sheet DP60 on the DVA web site www.dva.gov.au and or you can speak with one of our Advocates located in the Headquarters building across the road from the club.

1 Mar 1942	HMAS Perth sunk in Sunda Strait	Having survived the battle of the Java Sea HMAS Perth and the United States Cruiser Houston were sunk in a battle against overwhelming Japanese forces off the western tip of Java. 353 of Perth's 680 crew were killed in the battle.
2 Mar 1943	Battle of Bismarck Sea begins	A Japanese convoy of eight transport ships and eight escorting destroyers was almost annihi- lated by Allied air attacks as they attempted to reinforce the garrison at Lae. Of the 6,000 Japa- nese troops bound for Lae only 2,890 survived.
3 Mar 1942	Broome and Wyndham bombed	The Japanese air raid on Broome came when the port was crowded with refugees fleeing the Japanese invasion of the Netherlands East Indies. About 70 people, including many civilians are thought to have been killed in the raid. Japanese Attacks on Wyndham focused on the town's aerodrome.
11 Mar 1845	First Maori War	British troops based in Australia were sent to suppress an uprising by Maoris who were un- happy at the continuing expansion of European settlement in New Zealand's North Island.
11 Mar 1917	Baghdad occupied	Members of the 1st ANZAC Wireless Signal Squadron attached to Lieutenant General Stan- ley Maude's force of two British Army Corps and one Indian Cavalry Division occupy Baghdad.
12 Mar 1900	Australians arrive at Bloemfontein, South Africa	Members of the New South Wales Mounted Rifles, under Lord Roberts, reached Bloemfontein, the capital of the Orange Free State, under Roberts' strategy of taking the war into the Boer Republics.
14 Mar 1942	Horn Island bombed	Japanese bomb Horn Island, Torres Strait. Horn Island, in the Torres Strait, was the main tactical base for Allied air operations in the Torres Strait. The island was subject to nine Japanese air raids during the Second World War.
18 Mar 1915	Allied fleet attempts to force the Dardanelles	This was the second allied attempt to force a naval breakthrough of the Turkish defences in the Dardanelles.
20 Mar 2003	Iraq War	Australian military forces, as part of the US-led coalition, commence operations as part of the invasion of Iraq.
21 Mar 1942	Air battle for Port Moresby begins	The Japanese had hoped to occupy Port Moresby as a base from which to cut off shipping to Eastern Australia. Their defeat in the Battle of the Coral Sea thwarted the planned naval attack
		and invasion against Port Moresby.
