

Treasurer's Report

I would like to take this opportunity to wish you all a very happy and prosperous New Year. Due to Bugle deadlines and the threeday lock down, final figures were not available at time of going to print. However, what I can say is the Redlands RSL will finish in a very strong financial position. This in itself is no mean feat seeing the difficult circumstances we experienced with a 3-month closure and many other restrictions in 2020. It needs to be pointed out that when figures do become available they are subject to being audited. At the quarterly meeting, on the 24th January 2021, I will be able to give you a more accurate position on the financials.

Redlands RSL YTD Donations totalled \$588,469.39 with our Charitable and Well-being Affiliated donations totalling \$505,689.78 which is a superb effort in light of the difficult year we experienced. Charitable and Wellbeing non Affiliated totalled \$36,674.82.

A big thank you to all the Volunteers who have contributed a total of 7032 hours, which is a super effort, that included home visits, Pension applications, Reviews, Poppy Services, Library/Museum as well as other activities. The Volunteers were made up of 86 in total; 83 being from Redlands RSL and 3 from Dunwich.

Whilst the Redlands RSL and North Stradbroke Island RSL encountered strong head winds, they come through with flying colours, largely due to the hard decisions being made early by Management and a great business plan.

Deputy President & Cadets Report

2020 was a difficult year for all three Cadet Units in our region due to Coronavirus present in all states of Australia. This resulted in a shutdown of Units for a time and disruption in the ADF Cadet training programs were curtailed somewhat. Right now the Cadets Units and staff are currently on their summer break and will begin parading in early February to begin a new year of training and activities, hopefully free from Corona for 2021 training year. Normally as they start a new year, new recruits sign up to either the Army, Navy and Air Force Cadet Units which is one of the largest youth development organisations in the country.

Did you know that there are approximately 26,000 cadets currently enrolled in the three Cadet programs around Australia; 3,200 officers and instructors of cadets and 'approved helpers' supervise and support the young people engaged in the programs; and there are 508 ADF Cadets units in all states and territories. Cadet units occupy facilities in Defence establishments, Defence-owned or leased buildings, schools, and buildings leased by individual units. We are fortunate in the Redlands to have three Units that support us. It has been said that we are possibly the only RSL in Australia that has a Tri-Service parade annually, except this year due to the Virus.

The unit is on Holidays at the moment. Our first parade night for the year is planned for 19 January for NCO's. Until then there is guite a bit of Admin

being done by the staff in preparation for the start of what will hopefully be a better year in 2021.

In Dec the unit cadets attended CUO/WO2 promotion courses, it has been 12 months since the last promotion course, so it was good to see these start again. In mid-January we will have 6 cadets attending the SGT promotion course. Due to COVID the classroom part of the course is being done online, the course having a shortened length. Due to the social distancing rules the SGT's course will be split into 2 courses with our unit attending the 2nd one. Currently those on the course are working through their classroom work to have it finished by the deadline a week from the commencement of the course.

The unit will run a LCPL course in February and our Bn will run a CPL course in Term 2 so by the time we get to the middle of the year we should have caught up on the cadet courses and promotions that did not happen last year. Then we must concentrate on getting our staff through courses and their skills updated.

Before we go back, we expect the repairs to the damage the unit received in October from the heavy rain will have been completed or almost completed. We have had heavy rain again since the incident that caused the damage and I am pleased that no additional damage has occurred so the roof repairs we did at the time have fixed the problem. Once it is all repaired, we will look to purchase a new microwave and fridge for the orderly room. The fridge is not only used for milk for our beloved coffee machine but for medication and special dietary items for our cadets and staff. We were lucky with our Alarm system as after a service and replacement of a couple of parts it is working again. Thankfully we didn't have to purchase a new system.

217 Squadron held our end of year Graduation Parade on Monday the 30th of November 2020. This year a

cadet was presented with a new perpetual award for leadership in the honour of past Redlands RAAF Association President, WGCDR Lindsay Bennett. We are very proud to be able to present this award in the memory of Lindsay and it will be one that the cadets will strive to receive.

In January 2021 Senior cadets have been attending cadet promotion courses at Redcliffe, Enoggera and 2 Wing Headquarters, Archerfield. Squadron staff have also been involved in the training of these courses. Upon the completion of these courses 217 Squadron will have a full complement of NCO cadets to make a strong leadership team. This will ensure the continuing success of the squadron heading into the future.

217 Squadron is now getting prepared for the start of 2021 with

processing new recruit applications. Again this year we have had a strong interest in new cadets that should see the squadron reaching is full strength capacity of 75 cadets. We will be holding a Recruit Information night on the 28th January to induct these cadets into the AAFC.

Due to a very generous funding grant from the Redlands RSL, 217 Squadron have been able to fully upgrade the hardware of our 2 flight simulators. Due to the advancements of the flight sim software over the past several years the current hardware was unable to handle the program. This upgrade was essential to continue our flight simulation training program to cadets at the squadron, giving them a hands-on experience in aviation. We thank the Redlands RSL for considering our funding application and providing these muchneeded funds.

2021 should see AAFC cadets return to normal activities such as overnight bivouacs and powered flying activities. This is all pending of the evolving situation of the COVID-19 pandemic. The AAFC is also having its 80th anniversary therefore there will be local and national celebrations being conducted. The cadets are looking forward to a great year in 2021.

During 2020, we had a lot of sicknesses go through our volunteer group (not COVID related), and look forward to 2021 being a much better year for everybody concerned. An insignificant looking booklet donated by Annette & Denis Hall in 2020 has proved to be of interest. The booklet and accompanying receipts belonged to Annette's father. Research into the booklet, Serviceton Co-operative Society of Ex-servicemen Ltd. Rules, has shown that in 1946 Diggers returning from WW2 invested £50 each for the purchase and survey of 550 acres of land which was called Serviceton. Unfortunately the scheme failed due to lack of funds and the land was sold to the Queensland Housing Commission. The Queensland Housing Commission purchased approximately 1000 acres in this area at the time. Some of you may remember the suburb of Serviceton which has since been re-named and is now known as Inala.

There are many other interesting items on display in your RSL Library/Museum and we hope you will visit, re-visit, or tell family and friends to call in. Our friendly volunteers will welcome you.

LETTER FROM MEMBER...

January 12th 2021

Re: Redlands RSL Sub-Branch - 24th January 2021 Meeting

Dear President & Fellow Committee Members,

I've been reading the Redlands Sub-Branch November 2020 Edition of the "Bugle" (we live in Wellington Point) and read about the end of school year bursaries you give out to 6 local Redlands schools. Well done!

We too, have been doing that in Tasmania, at Sheffield High School and on King Island at Currie Area High School, since 2015 as ANZAC
Centenary Remembrance Awards. We had WW1 family tree soldiers from these districts to honour, and also included the local soldiers on each town's cenotaph in these Remembrance Awards. Les McFadzen
will know who we mean as he did a magnificent collation of the "Four Lynch brothers in WW1" and of their resilience in surviving.

Husband Ian Lynch and I haven't been able to be present at the above school awards days in Tasmania, until just now in December 2020, when we managed to have 17 days of COVID free travel in Tasmania and on King Island. SUPPORT FOR HOMELESS VETERANS

DVA is able to provide support to veterans and their families who are homeless, or at risk of becoming homeless.

14 December 2020

Many of the risk factors that can contribute to veteran homelessness are similar to those for the general population. These include negative life events such as relationship breakdowns, unemployment and mental ill-health.

DVA strives to ensure that these ex-serving Australian Defence Force (ADF) members have access to the services and support they and their families need. We can provide mental health support, social and peer support, and assistance with relationship or drug and alcohol problems.

DVA can also check to ensure that veterans are receiving all the financial support they may be entitled to, which can help ease other contributing pressures. Case management services may also be provided. If you know a veteran who is homeless or at risk of homelessness, please encourage them to contact DVA on 1800 VETERAN (1800 838 372).

Open Arms – Veterans & Families Counselling provides counselling and support services to current and former serving ADF members and their families, and operates a free telephone support line that is available 24 hours a day, 7 days a week, by calling 1800 011 046. Veterans and their family members can also talk with peers who have experienced military service, mental health issues, and recovery.

Open Arms also has the Crisis Accommodation Program which may be able to provide short-term accommodation to eligible current and former serving ADF members and their partners; and support to address issues that contributed to the crisis.

THIS MONTH IN AUSTRALIAN MILITARY

JANUARY

DATE	TITLE	EVENT
1 Jan 1975	Office of Australian War Graves established	The Office is responsible for the maintenance of the graves of Australia's war dead in 78 coun- tries around the world and in 76 war cemeteries within Australia.
2 Jan 1943	Buna Government Station captured	The Japanese withdrawal from the Kokoda trail enabled the allies to plan the encirclement of important Japanese positions in the Buna, Sanananda and Gona beachhead. Buna was the second of the three to fall to the allies after weeks of heavy fighting.
3 Jan 1941	6th Division in action at Bardia, Libya	The attack against the Italians at Bardia was the beginning of Australia's first major ground campaign of the Second World War.
4 Jan 1942	Japanese air attacks begin against Rabaul, New Britain	Rabaul possessed a number of airfields and one of the best natural harbours in the south-west Pacific. Its capture gave Japan a base from which to launch air attacks towards New Guinea and north-eastern Australia as well as a strong south-eastern corner to its defensive perimeter in the Pacific.
5 Jan 1945	HMAS Australia damaged by Kamikaze aircraft	Australian ships were operating in support of United States amphibious landings in the Lingayen Gulf, Philippines when the Australia, for the second time in the war, became one of seven Allied ships to be struck by Kamikaze aircraft. 25 of her crew were killed and 30 wounded.
8 Jan 1958	Last Australian servicemen return from Korea	At the end of hostilities in Korea the peninsula remained divided between North and South. The war has yet to officially end.
9 Jan 1966	1st Battalion, Royal Australian Regiment, in Operation Crimp	The operation became the scene of a major action against a Viet Cong tunnel complex.
11 Jan 1942	Japanese captured Tarakan island, Borneo	The success of Japan's war in South East Asia and the Pacific depended in large part upon the seizure of Borneo's oilfields, including those at Tarakan.
11 Jan 1973	Cessation of hostilities in Vietnam by Australian forces	The proclamation by the Governor-General, Sir Paul Hasluck, ended 11 years of Australian involvement in Vietnam, the longest duration of any war in Australia's history.

DATE	TITLE	EVENT
14 Jan 1942	Gemas, Malaya	8th Division inflicts heavy casualties on Japanese in an ambush at Gemas in the first Australian contact with Japanese troops of the Second World War.
16 Jan 1952	HMAS Sydney begins its seventh patrol in Korean waters	Sydney began its service in Korea in August 1951. This was the ship's final patrol in Korean waters.
17 Jan 1991	Coalition air attacks begin against Iraqi forces in Iraq and Kuwait	The first day of the Gulf War which ended when Iraqi forces were driven from Kuwait.
22 Jan 1941	Tobruk surrenders to Australian 6th Division	After its capture Tobruk was garrisoned by the 9th Division, elements of the 7th Division and other Allied units. The town was surrounded on three sides by the German Afrika Korps in April and remained besieged, but able to be re-supplied by sea, until December. Most Australian, however, left Tobruk between August and October.
24 Jan 1967	First contact at Bien Hoa, South Vietnam	Fighting at Bien Hoa involved a series of contacts between units of the 1st Australian Task Force and communist forces in the area of the Bien Hoa - Long Binh complex near Saigon. Australian and American units sought to dominate the area and prevent enemy rocket attacks on nearby military bases and installations.
26 Jan 1945	Beginning of Sandakan death march, Borneo	Sandakan prisoner of war camp was established by the Japanese in July 1942. Fearing invasion from Allied forces, Japanese troops marched the prisoners inland to Ranau in January 1945. Many of the prisoners died of malnutrition, exhaustion, disease and ill-treatment and the survivors were shot when they reached their destination. Only six out of 2,500 Australian and British prisoners sent to Sandakan survived.
28 Jan 1991	RAN Clearance Diving Team departs Perth for Kuwait	As part of Australia's commitment to the Gulf War a Royal Australian Navy Clearance Diving Team was dispatched to the Gulf for explosive ordnance demolition tasks.
30 Jan 1968	Tet offensive begins in Vietnam	While the Tet Offensive, named for Tet, the Vietnamese lunar new year holiday period over which the attacks occurred, was a military defeat for the Communist forces it proved to be a propaganda victory accelerating the American public's growing opposition to the war and causing United States military planners to question whether victory was possible.
