Treasurer's Report

As we move out of Summer and into Autumn both Redlands RSL and Nth Stradbroke Island RSL continue to post solid results. Gaming is the standout at both venues. Net Profit for both venues actual \$150,5825.74 against a budget of \$56,366.00 that is an increase of 167%, net profit on a to date basis is sitting at \$323,200.93 which is an excellent and is 142% in front of budget. When compared to last year at same time prior to covet last year the club is 81% up on previous year.

The overall members funds are \$27,215,456.14 and our bank business loan has come down to \$2,800,000. Our cash reserves
 remain resilient at \$3,387,522.76. Looking at the financials its quite apparent that your club is not only in good hands, it's also in a very solid financial position.

Redlands RSL and NSI League and Wellbeing expenses totalled

\$92,733.28 for the month of February and on a year-to-date basis \$161,811.92, its quite apparent the significance the Veterans and Service Personnel have in the Redlands RSL.

The month started with preparations for our Annual reports from all departments due later this month in preparation for our AGM. In addition to this President Alan and myself attended South East District RSL 99th AGM held this year at our Sub Branch. Thirty-two Sub Branches that form part of RSL South Eastern District attended, as well as representatives for RSL Qld and SED office.

The AGM was chaired by SED Acting President Kerry Gallagher AM.

The meeting started with a welcoming address by our President Alan Harcourt followed by presentation by Tony Ferris President of RSL Qld.

DID YOU KNOW...





During decades of global conflict, four-legged diggers have served alongside Australia's troops. Among their many duties, our enlisted mates have helped carry messages through the trenches, laid telephone wire, and carried ammunition and medical equipment from place to place. A dog's keen sense of smell aided our soldiers in tracking and searching for undetected mines, in a similar fashion to the bomb detector dogs of today. Australian Military forces enlisted the help of man's best friend during World War II when German shepherds were given the task of watching over valuable military equipment. In Vietnam, the Australian Task Force included dogs in combat tracking and their mission was to search the jungle for the enemy.

Following the war when Australian troops left Vietnam eleven four legged diggers were left behind. This is no longer the case today as these well trained dogs are returned with their handlers back to Australia as they are a valuable asset to defence. There are many types of working dogs across the globe – but few are more critical to human life than those that sniff out explosives today in Afghanistan. These dogs are saving the lives of Australian soldiers and civilians alike. Improvised Explosive Devices (IEDs) are the biggest threats to Australian soldiers in Afghanistan.

HOME ASSIST SECURE

The representative from Home Assist spoke to our Wellbeing Officers meeting advising of who is able to access their service.

There are three different organizations that veterans and their families can access for maintenance in the home. These being My Age Care (Federally funded), Home Assist Secure (State funded) and Department of Veterans Affairs. If you receive a maintenance package with My Age Care you cannot access Home Assist. To be eligible for Home Assist you need to be over 60 and receive a pension.

They will carry out maintenance such as changing light bulbs, cleaning guttering, cleaning of air conditioners, installing key safe outside front door if someone needs to enter your house in an emergency. There is no charge for labour only for equipment used.

Some of their services are also supplied by DVA Homecare, for example cleaning homes and fans. Clients are only able to access one of these three services.

A client contacted me regarding some small jobs needed done around the house and had phoned several organisations and they had not returned her calls. I am pleased to say after referral to Home Assist Secure these tasks have been done.

Please remember a lot of us are past the age when we should be climbing ladders to fix things and that is what these agencies are for.

1 Mar 1901	Naval and military forces of the States transferred to Commonwealth control	With Federation state and federal authorities began planning for the establishment of federal military forces.					
1 Mar 1942	HMAS Perth sunk in Sunda Strait	Having survived the battle of the Java Sea HMAS Perth and the United States Cruiser Hou- ston were sunk in a battle against overwhelm- ing Japanese forces off the western tip of Java. 353 of Perth's 680 crew were killed in the battle.					
3 Mar 1942	Broome and Wyndham bombed	The Japanese air raid on Broome came when the port was crowded with refugees fleeing the Japanese invasion of the Netherlands East Indies. About 70 people, including many civilians are thought to have been killed in the raid. Japanese Attacks on Wyndham focused on the town's aerodrome.					
9 Mar 1942	7th Division AIF arrives in Adelaide	Leading brigade of the 7th Division AIF arrives in Adelaide from the Middle East. Elements of the Division had been sent to Java where they soon became prisoners of the Japanese.					
13 Mar 1943	Japanese reconnaissance flight over Darwin	In addition to the 64 air raids on Darwin the Japanese made numerous reconnaissance flights over northern Australia.					
14 Mar 1942	Horn Island bombed	Japanese bomb Horn Island, Torres Strait. Horn Island, in the Torres Strait, was the main tactical base for Allied air operations in the Torres Strait. The island was subject to nine Japanese air raids during the Second World War.					
16 Mar 1942	Darwin bombed	Darwin was subject to 64 Japanese air raids during the Second World War.					
20 Mar 1916	ANZAC Corps land in France	With Gallipoli behind them the bulk of Australia's forces were now sent to France where the terrible fighting on the Western Front awaited.					
20 Mar 2003	Iraq War	Australian military forces, as part of the US-led coalition, commence operations as part of the invasion of Iraq.					
24 Mar 1942	Port Moresby bombed by Japanese	The Japanese had hoped to occupy Port Moresby as a base from which to cut off shipping to Eastern Australia. Their defeat in the Battle of the Coral Sea thwarted the planned naval attack and invasion against Port Moresby.
