Treasurer's Report

The Redlands RSL continues to trade well whilst North Stradbroke has hit a few head winds but the overall financial picture reads well from a financial perspective. On a more positive note, a caterer has been found for North Stradbroke Island, this will be implemented on a trial basis for now.

Net profit for both venue's actual came in at \$167,730.88 against a budget of \$35,190.00 which is an increase of 377%

Net profit on a to date basis is \$490,931.81 which speaks for itself on how the RSL is operating from a financial perspective that in itself reflects an increase of 191% of budget.

Overall members funds are \$27,533,769.76 our bank business loan

is currently sitting at \$2,740,000.00. Cash reserves remain resilient at \$3,887,557.35 and a further \$1,547,068.10 in operational funds. League and wellbeing expenses totalled \$94,512.24.

We often get enquiries from veterans in relation to legal matters and Bayside Law in Birkdale has kindly agreed to see any clients we recommend to them or you may call them direct. If you are incapacitated, they will call at your home.

Don't forget our three-day bus trip to Tenterfield is on 12th,13th and 14th May. Cost \$675 per person with nearly all meals included (see Page 22-23).

Sub Branch representatives have been invited to attend Anzac Day Services at schools and care facilities in the week before Anzac Day. Badge selling is on 22nd, 23rd and 24th in Woolworths Stockland from 08.30 - 16.00.

There has been talk about what services will be held at Redland Bay this year. For many years this was the responsibility of Redlands RSL but when a new Sub Branch was formed out there, they took over the running of their own Commemorations Services.

The Department of Veteran Affairs has an excellent publication entitled Planning Ahead, a guide to putting your affairs in order covering subjects such as legal and financial issues, Power of Attorney, assistance around your home and pension information. Deputy President & Cadets Report

At the end of last month, we had our AGM and election of officers. As a result, the board was re-elected for another term. Following the election President Alan Harcourt called the Cadet Commanders from Army, Navy, and Air Force to come forward for the annual presentation of funding cheques in order that the units can continue to fund activities. Following the presentation each Commander was asked to give a brief to our members on their respective Units activities and planning moving forward.

 The month also started with preparations for Anzac Day by again engaging the Cadet Units in preparation for Catafalque party
 training in order to be ready to mount the guard at the cenotaph at Dawn and main Service.

This month was a busy one as we prepared to host the RSL SED annual conference. One of the tasks was to contact organisations for materials and merchandise to place into sample bags that would be provided to the thirty-two delegates from the respective Sub Branches in our district. The other task for us was to move four uniformed mannequins and place them in front of the flags for a military display. In addition, we arranged for Army, Navy, Air Force Cadets and a piper to march in the colours at the start of the conference.

Following the cheque presentation the OC of 217 Sqn. AAFC FLTOFF

Matt Firth presented the new shoulder patch for the Air Force Cadets to the President of Redlands RAAF Association.

The Cadets assisted during the day by providing assistance by passing the microphone to delegates on the floor as delegates stood to speak.

At the end of the conference the executive of SED



presented a donation of \$100 to each Cadet Commander for their support and attendance.

Towards the end of this month we were asked if we would give a presentation on the three Cadets Units in the Redlands to the Women's Auxiliary, explaining our involvement and how the Sub Branch interacts with the Cadet Units. As a result the ladies now have a better understanding of the operations of the Cadets and our involvement with the Units.

Finally we got to do a field activity - 18 months since our last, and it was great.

Because this was predominantly about getting the 2020 and 2021 recruits through the bushcraft part of their recruit training we made it a 'long day' biv which started at 0700 and went through until 2200. Covid restrictions meant an overnight biv was going to be difficult with new cadets and social distancing. It was a big day, but we achieved everything we needed too so we are on a solid foundation again with everyone in the unit.

The weather forecast was terrible, and we nearly called it off, despite the forecast we got less than 20 mins rain all day and that was just after everyone had cooked their dinner, so we were very lucky.

Whilst the training was happening some of the senior cadets checked equipment and re furbished and restocked the platoon equipment boxes for our future bivs.

Earlier in the month we had our recruit uniform issue day and got the new recruits kitted out with uniform and equipment, we have only had a few recruits drop out so far, so if we have another intake around the 30 mark, we shall be back up to nearly our maximum number by midyear. This is something that we did expect to happen until mid-next year.

We have cadets going on the rescheduled SGTs course in April, and we have a CPL's course starting at the end of April and going over the long weekend, all these cadets have now started on the classroom part of the course. The SGT's course was rescheduled from last year to January, which was cancelled due to the snap lock down, so we were certainly worried about the lock down that happened in mid-March, but it looks like it will be ok for April as planned. Once these 2 courses happen there will be a number of promotions which will enable us to plug gaps in the rank structure, the unit should then have all rank positions filled.

The last 2 weeks of March are all about training for ANZAC day so the training in drill, dress and bearing is being done with a full-dress rehearsal the first week back after the holidays.

Throughout March of 2021, all Cadets including Recruits have been vigorously practising drill every

 Monday night for the upcoming annual ANZAC Day. It has been almost 2 years since the Squadron participated in the dawn service due to COVID-19. All Cadets in the Squadron can't wait to get that special feeling again of an ANZAC Day, and for those who have not experienced it yet are eagerly waiting for their chance.

On the 27th of March, the Cadets and Recruits got to experience a weekend full of action-packed simulated Bivouac games, drill and navigational exercises. In the morning of the 27th, Recruits finished up their training with an exam and are now on their way to becoming Australian Air Force Cadets. After that the Cadets set off on an adventure throughout the school to navigate from checkpoint to checkpoint with allocated images to radio in if found. There were 5 teams of 10 and each had a role to fulfil, it was good day to practise our skills and most importantly have FUN!

On the 28th, Cadets underwent bivouac games and drill practises. It started off with 5 rotations, each team allocated to a different station, for example Station 1 was a pack march and CNC (Cam and Concealment) game with cadets using their evade and conceal skills. Station 2 was the Flight Simulator where Cadets tested if they were aviator material. Station 3 was Drill with the CUO where Cadets marched proudly around the playground practising for the upcoming ANZAC Day. Station 4 was an 11B tent set up challenge where Cadets used teamwork and commitment to construct their bush tent that would be used on a Bivouac. Finally, Station 5 was a demonstration of setting up a hoochie also competitive small tent building where teams of two raced against each over. Then to end

things off with a mighty tugger war that had been declared with all cadets jumping into the conflict.

We as a Squadron are looking forward to the rest of 2021 with activities coming back into full swing.

THIS MONTH IN AUSTRALIAN MILITARY

APRIL APRIL

DATE	TITLE	EVENT
1 April 1921	First AIF disbanded	During the four years of the First World War the First AIF gained a reputation for military prow- ess that remains very much in the conscious- ness of Australians to the present day.
3 April 1885	Tamai	Tamai was the largest and most significant engagement in which the 770-man New South Wales contingent to the Sudan were involved. In comparison with the British units involved in the battle, Australian involvement was minimal.
4 April 1918	First action at Villers-Bretonneux	Villers-Bretonneux, overlooking the Somme and within artillery range of Amiens, was a principal objective when the German Spring Offensive was in its dying stages in early April. They were repulsed by the 9th Brigade from the 3rd Australian Division and some British units.
6 April 1942	US 41st Division arrives in Australia	Between December 1941 and August 1945 some one million Americans were stationed in Australia.
6 April 1952	1st Battalion, Royal Australian Regiment, arrives in Korea	The battalion remained in Korea until September 1953.
7 April 1916	Australians reach the Western Front	First Australian units of the 2nd Division arrived on Western Front and were introduced to fighting on the Western Front in what was called the 'nursery sector' in the relatively quiet area around Armentieres, France.
8 April 1918	Repatriation Department established	Once soldiers were demobilised all tasks aimed at their rehabilitation and return to civilian life became the responsibility of the Repatriation Department.
9 April 1942	HMAS Vampire sunk	The destroyer HMAS Vampire and the aircraft carrier HMS Hermes were sunk by Japanese bombers off Colombo in the Bay of Bengal.
9 April 1968	HMAS Sydney arrived at Vung Tau	The 1st Battalion, Royal Australian Regiment, disembarked and the 7th Battalion, Royal Australian Regiment, embarked. Sydney made 24 voyages to Vietnam during the war.
10 April 1941	Siege of Tobruk, Libya, begins	Tobruk was surrounded on three sides by the German Afrika Korps in April and remained besieged, but able to be re-supplied by sea, until December. Most Australians, however, left Tobruk between August and October.

DATE	TITLE	EVENT
11 April 1970	HMAS Vendetta returns to Sydney	HMAS Vendetta was the only one of three Australian Daring class destroyers to serve on the gunline in Vietnamese waters. The ship served one tour.
13 April 1983	Dedication of the Rats of Tobruk memorial	The memorial, on Anzac Parade, was dedicated by the Governor-General of Australia, the Right Hon Sir Ninian Stephen. The memorial commemorates the Australian and Allied servicemen who died during the siege of Tobruk in 1941.
19 April 1968	Dedication of the Desert Mounted Corps memorial	The memorial, on Anzac Parade, was dedicated by Prime Minister John Gorton. The memorial is based on the original unveiled at Port Said, Egypt, by former Prime Minister William Morris Hughes in 1932. It was destroyed during the Suez Crisis of 1956.
21 April 1917	Foundation of the Imperial War Graves Commission	The Imperial War Graves Commission was later renamed the Commonwealth War Graves Commission. It is responsible for erecting and maintaining war memorials and cemeteries.
23 April 1918	Ostend and Zeebruge, Belgium, raided	Eleven volunteers from HMAS Australia took part in a raid that aimed to prevent the Germans using these Belgian ports as a bases for their submarines.
25 April 1916	First commemoration of Anzac Day	The first anniversary of the Gallipoli landings was widely observed in Australia. Large crowds attended church services and public ceremonies . The day was also commemorated by Australian and New Zealand servicemen in Egypt and London.
28 April 1952	Australia ratifies peace treaty with Japan and official ending of the British Commonwealth Occupation Force (BCOF)	From the end of 1948 Australia had taken on the largest role in BCOF. When the state of occupation ended the Commonwealth organisation in Japan was redesignated British Commonwealth Forces Korea and continued supplying and administering Commonwealth forces then fighting in Korea.
29 April 1915	HMA Submarine AE2 sunk in the Sea of Marmara	AE2 was the first submarine to penetrate the Dardanelles. For five days the AE2 carried out orders to disrupt Turkish shipping. When her torpedoes were exhausted and she was attacked by Turkish gunboats the submarine was scuttled and her crew captured.
