The Day went well and in some circles it was said it was the best Anzac Day we have had. It is at this point that some praise needs to be laid on some people who I feel made Anzac Day 2021 a special one. As mentioned before Michael McDonnell and his wife Suzie put in a lot of work and time towards our commemorative days of which Anzac Day is one. Thank you both for making Anzac Day a special one for many veterans and their families I also thank all who helped, in so many different ways.

From badge sellers and school visitations, which I thank Linda for the organisation. To Ian Gray who ran around for 3 or 4 days organising "Honouring the Fallen" where Ian organises pupils from 4 schools to place an Australian flag on the graves of all the Veterans in Redlands including Stradbroke Island where John Hague assists with the students from the island. In all some 4,000 flags were placed on graves.

That is the management and staff of the club side of our operation, the management and staff along with Karleigh Little who does a power of work leading up to Anzac Day, making up and printing all of the hand outs, advertising and brochures for Anzac Day, they don't just happen. Thanks Karleigh.

It is always hard when you start thanking people that you may miss out on mentioning someone you should of, I can always do a blanket cover and thank every one that helped on the lead up and on the day and after, your help is always appreciated.

In a nut shell the day went well and the weather was great, couldn't of ordered better.

Treasurer's Report

The Redlands RSL is certainly breaking into new ground with superb results for April. Anzac Day in both venues were steady largely due to covid regulations with the normal breakfast being cancelled.

A couple of standouts in relation to performance at the Redlands RSL would have to be gaming and the bar both showing good increases. North Stradbroke Island is doing well in gaming, however struggling in other areas. The new caterer has started and there certainly has been some positives in particular Anzac Day.

Anzac Day expenses were \$70,804, which includes a \$10,000.00 sponsorship from Redland City Council and \$6,448.00 from Lion Nathan (2020, 2021 combined). These expenses added to a successful and professional running of Anzac Day.

Overall members funds are \$27,758,561, our bank business loan is currently sitting at \$2,680,000 cash reserves remain resilient at \$3,887,589 and a further \$1,602,275 in operational expenses. League and well-being expenses totalled \$77,447.

Suffice to say Redlands RSL is in a very good position at the end of April 2021.

I feel that this Group is one of the most important groups in our wellbeing program as it provides free of charge morning tea and sandwiches, entertainment, transport and we also reimburse taxi charges for those unable to use the Redlands RSL courtesy bus. It also enables our members to meet fortnightly in a safe environment and hopefully not be so socially isolated. A big thank you to Terry, Lorraine, Shellie, Lois, and Graeme (pictured below) and all the volunteers who have assisted with Golden Oldies over the years.



It was a pleasure to host our volunteers on Monday night for our Volunteers Thankyou during National Volunteers week. Unfortunately this year a directive was received from Army HQ in Canberra that Army Cadets were not to participate in Anzac Day Parades this year across Australia. We assume it was because of Covid-19 even when the Queensland Government made a last minute decision that there would be no restrictions for Anzac Day in Queensland. That was disappointing for the Army Cadets. Air Force and Navy Cadet Units were permitted to parade as normal.

We have had a busy month as both our planned courses went ahead. The SGT course was straight after Easter at Canungra where 4 CPL's attended,

this course was 12 months in the making - originally a CPL course for Easter last year, postponed to June, postponed to September, and then changed to an SGT course for January this year then due to the snap lockdown postponed yet again and finally it happened this April. The cadets had done the prep work for the original CPL course, then done the classroom part of the CPL course at the unit in term 3 last year. Then some time acting in the roles being mentored by senior cadets whilst completing the pre course and classroom work for their SGT's course.



We sent 12 LCPL & CDTs on the course which was held at Enoggera over the long weekend. The classroom work had been done at the unit and at home which will be the new norm for courses now. What a great course! The cadets all arrived knowing they were well prepared and confident. There were a couple of very late nights doing and practicing their orders. For 136 ACU it was very rewarding all our cadets finished in the top third of the course with 2 of the 3 awards awarded to our cadets. Cheers

ANZAC Day — Our Marching and Drill was looking good and then we were advised that due to a directive from Canberra that we were not allowed to March or participate as we normally do. We were very disappointed and started working on a plan to do what we could within the rules. Our senior cadets came up with some plans which we then fine tuned and took to our Battalion who endorsed and supported them to HQ. We were allowed a maximum of 15 cadets at the Dawn and Main service 'socially distanced' between the

services we went back to the unit and had a unit breakfast followed by a service and our own with a wreath laying. After that, the 15 cadets were picked up by their parents and delivered back to the Main service at Cleveland, whilst the remainder of the unit cleaning and refurbished the area. It was a great effort by all including our cadets' parents who had to take the cadets to the Dawn service back to the unit and then back to the RSL. Not what we had in mind at the start of the month but again proving that our cadets are full of resilience when thrown a curve ball and learning all the skills we try to impart in them about problem solving, thinking on their feet, and overcoming obstacles.

217 SQN AUSTRALIAN AIR FORCE CADET UNIT

2021 saw major milestones for Australia, the Centenary of the Royal Australian Air Force, the 80th

Anniversary of the Australian Air Force Cadets, and the first Anzac Day to take place since the beginning of the COVID-19 pandemic.

The 31st of March marked the centenary of the RAAF, celebrated with the largest flyover since World War II, a message from HRH Prince William, and a televised Queen's Colour Parade in Canberra. This year also saw the 80th anniversary of the establishment of the AAFC, celebrated with the launch of a balloon with SQN patches of all units around Australia and the issuing of a special commemorative patch designed by CSGT of 403 SQN (Beaconsfield, VIC).

The 25th of April 2021 commemorates the 106th anniversary since

ANZAC troops landed on the beaches of Gallipoli in what marked the first major action Australia fought since Federation and formation of the Commonwealth. The impact of COVID-19 saw last year's Anzac Day services cancelled nationwide because of restrictions, with a driveway vigil being encouraged. This year with the easing of restrictions and beginning of the vaccine rollout, states held Anzac Day dawn and day services. This year's dawn service at Cleveland had a large turnout from the community, representing the significance this special occasion has for all Australians. The dawn service saw 217 SON forming an honour guard for the veterans before marching down to the cenotaph to observe the dawn service proceedings. 5 Cadets were on catafalgue party with 1 other Cadet on flag. Six cadets escorted wreath layers during both dawn and day services. The day service had cadets marching with the flags of Australia, New Zealand and the United States and CCPL Lee having the honour of marching with the hat of the fallen soldier. Speeches from members of the RSL, ADF and community contributed to this special occasion. Anzac Day is not just dedicated to the original ANZACs, but to all ADF personnel, past and present who's sacrifice and service have ensured the safety and continued growth of Australia.


SECOND SON OF A SOLDIER SETTLER – ON THE SPECTRUM

1 May 1945	26th Brigade, 9th Division, troops invade Tarakan	General MacArthur instructed Lieutenant General Sir Leslie Morshead, commander of I Corps, to seize and hold Tarakan Island and destroy the enemy forces there. The Netherlands East Indies Government was to be re-established, Tarakan's oil producing capacity was to be conserved and the island's airfields put into use. The operation was codenamed Oboe 1, and the invasion began on 1 May 1945. Within five days the town and airstrip had been secured.	
4 May 1915	Australian attack on Gaba Tepe, Gallipoli	The attack on Gaba Tepe by the 11th Battalion was an ill-conceived venture to deny the Turks a vantage point from which they could observe operations around Anzac Cove. It ended in failure.	
4 May 1942	Battle of Coral Sea begins	This was the first naval engagement fought by aircraft alone. Although neither side won a clear victory, the Japanese were forced to attempt to capture Port Moresby in a ground campaign, rather than by sea as they had hoped.	
7 May 1945	Germany surrenders	Germany's surrender, signed at the French city of Reims, ended the Second World War in Europe.	
10 May 1900	Zand River	New South Wales Mounted Rifles in action at Zand River, South Africa.	
13 May 1968	Fire Support Base Coral attacked	The partly-constructed base, north of Saigon, was defended by Australian infantry, artillery, and air support when it was attacked by North Vietnamese troops. Eleven Australians were killed and 28 wounded before the attackers were driven back. Fifty-two enemy soldiers were killed and one was taken prisoner.	
14 May 1943	Centaur sunk	The hospital ship Centaur was sunk by a Japanese submarine off the south Queensland coast. Only 64 of the 333 on board survived.	
14 May 1956	Sungei Siput, Malaya	2nd Battalion, Royal Australian Regiment, attacks communist terrorists near Sungai Siput, Malaya.	
16 May 1943	Dam Busters raid	No. 617 Squadron carry out the Dam Busters raid against targets in the Ruhr Valley, Germany. A significant number of Australians took part in the raid.

18 May 1885	Sudan contingent departs Suakin	New South Wales troops of the Sudan contingent depart Suakin for Sydney, having spent a little over two months in the Sudan without seeing any serious action.	
21 May 1968	HMAS Sydney leaves Brisbane	HMAS Sydney leaves Brisbane on its tenth voyage to Vietnam with 4th Battalion, Royal Australian Regiment, embarked.	
24 May 1915	Formal truce on Gallipoli	A formal truce was declared on Gallipoli during which the Turkish dead of the 19 May attacks were buried.	
26 May 1968	Fire Support Base Balmoral attacked	Fire Support Base Balmoral, just north of FSB Coral, was attacked by a North Vietnamese Army battalion. Three soldiers from 3rd Battal- ion, Royal Australian Regiment, were killed and 14 wounded. Six enemy bodies were found.	
28 May 1968	Fire Support Base Balmoral attacked for a second time	A second heavy assault on Fire Support Base Balmoral took place in the early hours of the morning. The attack was driven off by combined arms — infantry, armour, artillery and air sup- port. Forty-two enemy bodies were found on the battlefield and seven prisoners were taken.	
28 May 1970	Australian Army Training Team Vietnam awarded United States Meritorious Citation	Australian Army Training Team Vietnam awarded United States Meritorious Citation.	
30 May 1942	RAAF participates in first 1,000-bomber raid	First 1,000-bomber raid launched by the RAF. The target was Cologne, Germany. To make up the numbers crews were taken from operational training units to participate in the raid.	
31 May 1918	Monash made commander of the Australian Corps	Lieutenant General Sir John Monash succeeds Birdwood as General Officer Commanding the Australian Corps.	
31 May 1902	Boer War ends	Boers surrender, ending the Boer War. Over 16,000 Australians served in South Africa, of whom nearly 600 died.	
31 May 1942	Japanese midget submarines raid Sydney Harbour	Of the three Japanese submarines that attacked Sydney Harbour, two were destroyed or disabled during the raid; the third disappeared and was located off Sydney's northern beaches by a group of amateur divers in November 2006. Little material damage was caused by the attack, but 21 sailors were killed when the depot ship HMAS Kuttabul was torpedoed.
