Normal trading appears to be back at Redlands RSL. February was a solid month with a very good net profit result Actual \$254,344.05 Budget \$122,892.00 Variance \$131,452.05 – 107% Increase on budget. To date Actual \$373,397.59 Budget \$222,542.00 Variance \$150,855.59 – 68% Increase on budget.

With the Redlands RSL about to enter its final stage of extensions all financials read well. Overall Members Funds \$29,532,476.83; Current Assets Total \$7,398,388.49; Non-current Assets \$25,843,726.42; Current Liabilities \$2,328,113.27; Bank Business Loan \$1,320,000.00; Investment Account Balance \$4,387,932.67 and Operational Funds \$2,084,843.70.

Normality is really settling back in at the Redlands RSL. After a twoyear suspension due to COVID, the Community Grants Programme will return later in 2022.

With the final stage of extensions at the Redlands RSL, we will see the culmination of strategic planning, vision, team work all come together to get the desired outcome.

VETERANS & WELLBEING EXCURSIONS

This year is well underway. By the time we have our meeting, we would have had our second trip for the year (Tuesday 22nd March 2022) on our trip around South East Qld Dams that is a sell-out.

The next trip we are embarking on is a 3 day trip to Bundaberg. See pages 20 & 21 for itinerary. This trip will take place on the 11th, 12th & 13th May 2022.

Day 1 includes a visit to the famous Bundaberg Rum Distillery with sampling included in the price.

Day 2 is a trip on a luxury catamaran to Lady Musgrave Island. This is a full day that includes snorkelling, checking out the reef in a glass bottom boat looking at the marine life, plus a walk on the island. A magnificent lunch is inclusive on board the boat.

Day 3 we visit the magnificent Botanical Gardens and the Bert Hinkler Aviation Museum, then make our way back home.

The cost of this trip is \$795 per person twin share (+\$110 single supplement). This cost is dependant on 36 passengers bookings and paying in full by Thursday 28th April 2022, otherwise there will be an incremental increase depending on the amount of passengers who book. This trip represents exceptional value!

The Bundaberg trip can be paid over three instalments:

- \$350pp (twin share) or \$460 (if single) deposit required at the time of booking
- \$250pp by Wednesday 23rd March 2022
- \$195pp by Thursday 28th April 2022 final payment.

Or, the full amount can be paid at time of booking.

Please note that this trip is available for Redlands RSL Service members and one partner only.

Again, this price is dependant on 36 passengers.

ADF OUT IN FORCE FOR FLOOD CLEANUP

More than 7000 Australian Defence Force personnel are currently assigned to Operation Flood Assist 2022 across NSW and Queensland.

Australian and Fijian soldiers are working side by side in northern New South Wales to rebuild a community access road as part of Operation Flood Assist 2022. Republic of Fiji Military Forces (RFMF) personnel had intended to spend their three months in Australia this year on Exercise Coral Warrior, but the significant flooding and devastation has seen our Pacific neighbours volunteering their time to help Australian communities clean up.



Soldiers support in Sackville: Trudging through still-muddy grounds, Sydney-based soldiers worked with NSW Fire and Rescue to assist in the clean-up of Sackville Ski Gardens holiday park during Operation Flood Assist 2022. The caravan park had endured its second flood in 12 months, with flood-levels peaking over a metre higher than floods experienced in the summer of 2021. With his caravans up-turned, broken and filled with mud, resident Grant Moynihan said it was hard to know where to start the clean-up, although appreciative of the support provided by personnel from the Australian Army.

Hay is on its way: An award-winning cattle farm in Casino can start recovering its herd after receiving the Australian Army's first hay delivery to the region on March 12. Soldiers from 5th Battalion, Royal Australian Regiment (5RAR), delivered 50 bales to Mogul Brahman Stud Farm at Yorklea, just outside Casino, after strong floods inundated the property.

Northern Australian reservists answer the call: A contingent from 51st Battalion, Far North Queensland Regiment, deployed from across Cape York and the Torres Strait to support Operation Flood Assist 2022. 3 Mar 1942	Broome and Wyndham bombed	The Japanese air raid on Broome came when the port was crowded with refugees fleeing the Japanese invasion of the Netherlands East Indies. About 70 people, including many civilians are thought to have been killed in the raid. Japanese Attacks on Wyndham focused on the town's aerodrome.	
5 Mar 1970	HMAS Sydney arrives at Fremantle, en route to Sydney	On board was 5th Battalion, Royal Australian Regiment, which had completed a tour in Vietnam. HMAS Sydney made 21 voyages to Vietnam during the war.
