Treasurer's Report

We have now reached the halfway point of 2022 and from a financial perspective; Redlands RSL is in a very strong position. Our net profit for June 2022 Actual \$128,855.00, Budget \$83,254.00, Variance \$45,601.73. To date for 2022 Actual \$1,016,119.00, Budget \$507,290.00, Variance \$508,829.00. Depreciation figure is \$233,818.00 over last year on a to-date basis, so suffice to say we are in a very strong position.

Overall Members Funds are \$30,175,198.00, Current Asset total \$9,942,234.00, Current Liabilities \$3,293,040.00, Non-Current Liabilities \$1,824,206.00 against Non-Current Liabilities (Bank Business Loan) \$1,760,000.00. Cash Reserves remain resilient at \$4,215,266.00 and a further \$945,158 in Operational Funds.

League and Wellbeing totalled \$75,510.00 for June 2022.

Thank you to the dedicated band of volunteers who have contributed 5292 hours to June towards home visits, pension applications/ reviews, poppy services, commemorative days, golden oldies, library/museum, charitable and wellbeing.

As at 30/06/2022, our Cash in Kind Donations totalled \$511,640.66.

Finally, as we really start to get into the refurbishment, I encourage all Veterans and members to book if you are going to be dining at the RSL to avoid disappointment. However, the benefits that will be gained are really going to benefit all with a state of the art Redlands RSI on the horizon.

During this reporting month our President Alan Harcourt and myself attended RSL Qld Congress late in June. A full report on the Congress will be tabled at our monthly meeting for your information as the report is too large to be printed in the Bugle. Both Alan and I attended the RSL SED Delegates meeting held on the 7th of July at SED HQ at New Farm. See highlights of that meeting in this months Bugle.

The main highlight, apart from the normal meeting was a presentation from The General Manager of 'Service Delivery" Graeme Alley from RSL Qld who outlined how the new Wellbeing Services Program has been rolled out and implemented. This full package is now fully operational to Veterans and Sub Branches. For all wellbeing programs assistance and advocacy services, they encourage Veterans to have a chat with RSL Queensland's Veteran Services team to see what their options are. The second presentation was from Hugh Poulson from Sunnybank Sub Branch who presented a suggested upgrade of RSL "Recognition of Service" program as the one in place from National and State is not fit for purpose, is out of date and doesn't suit our members in todays RSL. His proposal will now go to the State Board for consideration. In our perspective his proposal has merit.

On the 14th July we conducted a 4 hour Volunteer induction program that was held in the Veterans Centre for thirteen Volunteers in order to comply with section 28 of the Work Place Health and Safety Act, duty of worker.

Cadets will be starting preparations for Vietnam Veterans Day Service to be held on the 18th August at Anzac Park at 01000 hrs.

Our new recruits Marched In and their training is progressing nicely, after the holidays we will get into the more exciting training and of course their

training biv in August. The number of new recruits is down but with Covid still hanging around we are aware of some potential new

recruits choosing to wait until next year.

We held a very successful LCPL course at the unit and the test results where very encouraging and a great sign for the future. During the course we had a visitor from our National HQ in Canberra — Our National RSM was visiting Brisbane for an Army W01 conference, and he wanted to see a local Cadet Unit before he went back down south — our unit was selected so he along with our Bde RSM arrived for quick visit and a tour of our facilities — while he was there he was pleased to answer numerous questions from the cadets and staff across many topics.

From peacekeeping in the Africas, Europe, the Middle East and Pacific, to conflict in Iraq and Afghanistan, nursing officers, doctors, infantry and special forces, naval and submarine officers, dog handlers and airmen will step forward painting a colourful picture and adding vital knowledge about our military heritage. The real-world experiences of veterans who have shaped our

recent history will be captured through professional audio-visual recordings ensuring their service and stories are preserved for future generations with dignity.

The fascinating line-up includes the first female Executive Officer of a submarine; the female General who commanded a mixed force of 600 UN police and military in Cyprus; the Captain of HMAS Darwin in the Persian Gulf; the infantry force commander and female doctor awarded the Medal of Gallantry in Rwanda; the Bush Tucker Man; a Commando officer; the RAAF officer supervising the extraction from Afghanistan who was 'last man out'; the war dog and handler who found the largest intelligence cache of the Afghan war; and many more.

Their stories have rarely — if ever — been told in public but are crucial to our military heritage.

The Military Spectacular is expected to attract hundreds of visitors to Queensland's Sunshine Coast region, giving locals and visitors alike a real understanding of Australia's modern wartime heritage through the eyes of those who lived and created our history. 1 July 1945	7th Division landed at Balikpapan, Borneo	The landing at Balikpapan was the largest and final Australian amphibious landing of the Second World War.	
2 July 1950	No. 77 Squadron flies first combat mission in Korea	First combat mission flown by No. 77 Squadron, RAAF, in Korea. No. 77 Squadron was the first Australian unit committed to the war in Korea.	
6 July 1943	Darwin bombed	Darwin was bombed 64 times during the Second World War.	
10 July 1940	Beginning of the Battle of Britain	The Battle of Britain was an aerial battle between the Royal Air Force and the German Luftwaffe for control of the skies over southern Britain, a necessary prerequisite for the planned German invasion of the island. After some three months of intensive aerial operations both sides had lost heavily but the Germans were forced to abandon their plans for a cross-channel invasion of England.	
13 July 1953	HMAS Tobruk begins a two- week patrol of the northern part of Korea's east coast	This was the Tobruk's last patrol before the war in Korea ended in late July 1953.	
15 July 1940	Volunteer Defence Force formed	The Volunteer Defence Force (VDC), composed mainly of First World War veterans, was formed for home defence by the Returned and Services League (RSL).	
19 July 1916	Battle of Fromelles	A total of 5,533 Australians were killed or wounded in this battle, most on the night of 19–20 July. Fromelles was the first battle for the Australians on the Western Front.	
20 July 1943	HMAS Hobart torpedoed	HMAS Hobart torpedoed off San Cristobal, Solo- mon Islands. Seven officers and six ratings were killed in the attack. Though badly damaged the Hobart was able to reach Espirtu Santo the next day.	
22 July 1917	Four members of the Australian Army Nursing Service win the Military Medal	Four members of the Australian Army Nursing Service, Sisters Cawood, Deacon and Ross-King and Staff Nurse Derrer, won Military Medals for rescuing patients trapped in a burning Casualty Clearing Station at Trois Arbes, France. These were the first bravery awards won by Australian nurses in action.
