President's Report

I hope this finds everyone in good health.

National Volunteers Week, from 20th-26th May, was the ideal time to recognise our Volunteers and it was great to see so many attend our function on Monday 20th May. Congratulations to Graham Hinson who was awarded Volunteer of the Year, a worthy recipient for all the work he does with our district schools.

On Thursday 6th June, Redlands RSL commemorated the 80th Anniversary of the D-Day landings on the coast of Normandy, France. Code name Operation Overlord, it was the largest naval, air and land operation in history, landing 160,000 troops in a day, to begin the liberation of Nazi occupied Europe from the west. Australia's main contribution came in the air, with approximately 2,800 airmen in RAAF and RAF squadrons. June 1944 would be the worst month ever for RAAF casualties.

The Redlands commemoration in Anzac Memorial Park, involved the lighting of a Lantern of Peace while a tribute was read for all those who took part, particularly those who paid the supreme sacrifice. This symbolic gesture would be repeated in many places around the world. The Lantern remained alight on the bar of Redlands RSL for the remainder of the day.

The RSL QLD State Congress will be held on the 22nd June. Sub-Branches throughout the state will be required to decide on the State President for the next three years from two candidates; and a vote on two Motions. You, the members, will decide which way our Sub-Branch will vote on these issues in the League Gathering on Sunday 16th June.

A reminder that next year, 2025, will mark the Centenary of Redlands RSL.

League and Wellbeing expenses totalled \$117,021.00 for May. Here are some areas where money is being allocated — Young Veterans \$2,400.00, Bugle and Bay Breeze Publications \$2,648.00 and League bus \$2,043.00.

Year to date members funds \$31,307,207.00, Current Assets total \$3,033,173.00, Current Liabilities \$2,901,586.00, bank business loan \$5,764,694.00. Our cash reserves remain resilient at \$1,593,897.00 and there is a further \$525,997.00 in operational funds.

New ideas and initiatives are always being looked at, at the Redlands RSL. Redlands RSL certainly has strong patronage which certainly is reflected in the foot traffic.

I visited Keith Overton at his home to ask if he would be able too come to the RSL for a lunch and presentation of his 100th year framed certificate congratulating him on his100th birthday and in recognition of his being an inspirational member of the League. Keith served with the Australian Navy during the Second World War. He said he would be delighted to attend . Last Friday, a luncheon

was prepared specifically for Keith, and in attendance was our President Rob Wilson, Keith Overton, his son Jim and wife Lyn Overton and myself. President Rob Wilson presented him with his framed certificate and this was followed by the cutting of the cake made especially for the occasion.





In preparation for the 80th Anniversary of D-Day commemoration on the 6th June, I visited Herb Shapcott a WW2 veteran, to ask if he could attend and light the lantern of peace on the day. Herb stated he would be honoured to do so. That day marks the 80th anniversary of the D-Day landings in Normandy, France, on 6 June 1944. D-day commemoration was held in Anzac park next door to our HQ building. In attendance was our President Rob Wilson, Vice President David Field, league Secretary MC Michael McDonnell, President Nigel Allsopp AWAMO, WW2 Veteran Herb Shapcott and Nathaniel a visiting Padre from the UK.

Nigel Allsopp donated a peace lamp, one of 80 in the world and which he obtained from the UK for the occasion to our Sub Branch. He stated that following the service he would donate the lamp to our museum.

Following the service we all retired to the RSL Club for camaraderie.

TS NORFOLK AUSTRALIAN NAVY CADET UNIT

TS Norfolk's staff and cadets have achieved an actionpacked semester 1. As mentioned in our previous

report, Australian Navy Cadets have implemented the new Cadet Youth Development Continuum. 16 elective badges ranging in skill at arms, drone flying, first aid, drumming, and Robotics have been awarded to cadets. Two cadets were the first to achieve the Level 3 (Gold) achievement in Skill at Arms, where they are now qualified to train cadets in this elective.

Our First term saw the ship's company participating in the first of our Maritime Activities, where the cadets, under the supervision of staff operated our RHIB and Dorey power boats, kayaked and canoed in perfect weather conditions. More Maritime Days are planned in Terms 3 & 4.



Members of the ship's company at TS Norfolk participated in two activities with their AAFC cousins. Firstly, there was the Cadet Aviation Experience at RAAF Amberley, where staff and cadets flew in Diamond 4-seater propellor powered aircraft with magnificent views towards Moreton Bay and the Darling Downs region. The day ended with staff and cadets observing at ground level the take offs of 3 C-17 Transport Aircraft and spoke with mechanics and technicians servicing rescue helicopters.

Members of TS Norfolk took part in the Freedom of Entry march & ceremony of 95 Wing Royal Australian Air Force in Redlands. Another day of perfect conditions in Redlands, paid respects as the colours marched past followed by a low level fly by of another C-17 Transport impressing the community present.

Anzac Day 2024 has come and gone with staff and cadets participating in ceremonies and services at Wellington Point State High School and Wellington Point High School as well as the dawn service and 10:30am street marches and services with Redlands RSL. Working with their comrades from the AAFC and ACU, assisted veterans and organisations with laying of wreaths during the Anzac Day services. I am pleased to report a significant increase in cadet participation in their respective school community Anzac Day services with 13 cadets participating in 8 school services. Excellent effort all round.

As part of the CYDC program, 20 cadets were promoted to their next rank, 7 were promoted to CDT Able Seaman and 13 to the rank of CDT Seaman. The newly promoted Able Seaman and those at current rank are completing the Marine Engineering Specialist Rate.



This rate is one of three Cadets can choose to specialise in and can nominate to complete all three and interchange which rate they wish to be. Three cadets were promoted to Cadet Leading Seaman under the previous system for outstanding effort towards the unit. These cadets had performed above and beyond in the areas of Health & Safety and Mentoring of junior cadets. During the June school holidays a number of cadets will be taking part in the Flotilla training program for those wishing to be promoted to Leading Seaman, Petty Officer, Chief Petty Officer, with other cadets progressing their elective training to Level 3.

DATE	TITLE	EVENT
1 June 1918	RAN aircraft first used in combat	First use of aircraft in combat by ships of the Royal Australian Navy in the Heligoland Bight. Aircraft were launched from HMAS Sydney and Melbourne to intercept two German aircraft.
1 June 1941	Evacuation from Crete completed	Over 16,000 troops were successfully evacuated from the island over four successive nights.
2 June 1967	2nd Battalion, Royal Australian Regiment, arrives in Vietnam	By 1967 Australia's commitment to the war in Vietnam was increasing as the Australian Task Force expanded its control over areas of Phuc Tuy Province.
3 June 1944	Last major air combat by RAAF in the Second World War	South of Biak Isand 15 P-40Ns from No. 78 Squadron attacked 15 Japanese aircraft (12 fighters and three dive-bombers) and succeeded in shooting down seven fighters and all of the dive-bombers for the loss of one P-40 and pilot.
6 June 1944	D-Day	Allies land in Normandy, opening up a third front against Germany and beginning an eastward drive across northern Europe that ended with Germany's surrender in May 1945.
8 June 1942	Sydney and Newcastle shelled	A week after they launched the midget submarines that attacked Sydney Harbour, four large Japanese submarines shell Sydney and Newcastle, but to little effect.
10 June 1940	Italy declares war on the Allies	Hoping to profit from the German successes early in the war, the Italian dictator Mussolini declared war on the Allies in June 1940, by which time the most vocal Italian dissidents were in exile or in prison.
14 June 1966	6th Battalion, Royal Australian Regiment, arrives in South Vietnam	The deployment of the 6th Battalion, Royal Australian Regiment, to Vietnam formed part of Australia's build up of forces in Phouc Tuy province in the mid-1960s. D Company from this battalion became involved in the battle of Long Tan on 18 August 1966.
16 June 1948	Malayan Emergency declared	The Australian involvement in Malayan Emergency lasted from 1950 to 1960, making it the longest continuing military commitment in our history. 39 Australian servicemen died in this conflict.
20 June 1943	Darwin bombed	Darwin was bombed by Japanese aircraft 64 times during the Second World War.
29 June 1950	Australia commits military units to the United Nations Force in Korea	Australia was one of the first nations to commit units, from each of the three services, to the war in Korea. Australians in Korea fought as part of the UN Command.
