The Final Report from the Royal Commission into Defence and Veteran Suicide has been released. Understandably, the Government is yet to announce whether it will adopt all or part of the recommendations.



came together. AFX is made up of 3 tiers; 1, basic introduction to fieldcraft for the 1st year cadets, 2, where the 2nd year cadets pick an elective (survival, public relations, reconnaissance, communications and engineering to name a few) and learnt how to shoot the inservice rifle. And 3, where the senior cadets spend time with full time soldiers learning advanced fieldcraft. 136 ACU events update

136 Army Cadet Unit (ACU) has had a fun, activity packed, productive year in 2024. 136ACU has been involved in a multitude of activities and events including ANZAC Day, the Enogerra open day and a weekend camp in term two, a recognition parade where over 20 recruits were promoted to cadets, Legacy fundraising, Exercise Dragon Steps and the Annual Field Exercise (AFX) in term 3 and Annual Dinner, Remembrance Day, Vietnam Veteran's Day and Christmas fundraising in term 4.



This year, one of our goals was to expand the unit and increase cadet numbers. To achieve this, we have had three recruit intakes (one each term), rather than two intakes (one each semester) and have increased our advertisement of the unit. We have had large intakes each term and that, along with the large recognition parade has allowed us to reach our goal of expanding the unit.

The AFX is a battalion organised event that occurred for a week over the September holidays. Many of 136 ACU's cadets participated in AFX and came back bearing stories of their experiences across the different activities included in AFX. Participating in this camp gave the cadets a good chance to act independently and gain a realistic bush experience.



A significant community event that 136 ACU assisted in was the Legacy Fundraising. 136 ACU has been supporting the Legacy group for several years and this year was no different. Several cadets volunteered their time to assist with Legacy fundraising and ended up raising a significant amount which largely assisted the Legacy group. Many cadets who are in the catafalque party have represented 136 ACU in the Remembrance Day and Vietnam Veteran's Day ceremonies this semester, as well as in the ANZAC Day ceremony at the beginning of the year. This has allowed the unit to be apart of the traditions of these significant days.

Overall, 136 ACU has participated in many activities from fundraising to ceremonial activities and has expanded with each recruit intake. We have had a fun, participative year and look forward to what will come in 2025.



TS NORFOLK AUSTRALIAN NAVY CADET UNIT

Over the holidays, three cadets attended the National Activity at HMAS Cerberus. These cadets

not only met cadets from other states or territories, but took part in activities such as a simulated ship sinking simulator (they had to stop the flooding in the compartment while it listed 5 degrees to port), simulated fire fighting exercises, drone flying, RHIB sailing as well as meeting members of the ADF.

Two cadets received their level 3 (Gold) in First Aid, where they are allowed to wear their qualification on their dress uniforms, but can train current and future cadets in First Aid. This is part of Navy cadet's Cadet Youth Development Continuum where cadets can get qualifications in drone flying, cooking, drumming, first aid, PT, power-boating to name a few of the qualifications.

Staff and cadets will be conducting our first maritime activity on Thursday 10th October 2024. Cadets, under the supervision of staff will coxswain our two powerboats, one RHIB and one Dory (8 seater tinny) before dusk.

TS Norfolk cadets have nominated to attend the December 2024 Specialist Training courses at Gallipoli Barracks. Cadets will interact and make long term friendships with other cadets, but also accelerate their career progression by attending courses to obtain their next promotion and skill sets in the above specialities.

TS Norfolk will be hosting a bring a mate night on 7th November 2024. This is a open night for those who are interested in joining cadets and would like to know more about the programme.

TS Norfolk parades every Thursday night between 1730 hours to 2030 hours during the school term. Australian Navy Cadets are open to all genders the year they turn 13 to aged 18 years.

SED HIGHLIGHTS FROM COUNCIL MEETING 5TH SEPTEMBER 2024

SED MEETING:

South East District Meeting chaired by SED President Kerry Gallagher AM. Attended by Rob Wilson and myself on behalf of Redlands Sub Branch. Apart from the routine business of correspondence, financial report and other reports, the main highlights were:

Garry Alterator gave a presentation on how a Poppy Service should be conducted and Jessica Tonzing from RSL QLD League Services and Carla Gerbich from IT Project Team gave a presentation on 'Why RSL QLD needs to revise the Current Managed IT Services'. Garry Alterator spoke about the Poppy Services for SED RSL's Sub Branches and they should be conducted for our fallen comrades at a funeral or memorial service. The Poppy Service should be adjunct to a service, and it is for the fallen veterans' comrades to say farewell in a solemn but ceremonial way.

The following need to occur once the Sub Branch is notified of the members passing:

- Contact the family and offer your condolences.
- At the appropriate time ask if they wish for a Poppy Service to be conducted.
- If the family agrees for a poppy service, the Sub Branch representative should explain that this service is for the late member's service comrades to say their farewell.
- Once the family has agreed for the service to take place the servicemen's Eulogy service record should be requested from ADF.Records@defence.gov.au
- A framed copy of the record of service can be presented to the family after the service.
- Once the service is confirmed the funeral service company conducting the service is to be contacted to confirm the following:
 - What stage is the poppy service to be conducted
 - Do they have enough poppies

- They have a recording of the last post and rouse (if they do not have these items, SED SQ can provide them)

The service can be conducted by one or two members of the Sub Branch. One to conduct the service and one to help distribute the poppies at the end of the service. If only one person is available, the funeral company can assist with this task.

Jessica Tonzing from RSL QLD League Services and Carla Gerbich from IT Project Team spoke about:

- Why RSL Queensland needs to revise the current Managed IT Services provided to Sub Branches
- What Managed IT services options they are considering
- What are the advantages and disadvantages of each option
- Where to get more information

Why RSL Queensland needs to revise the current Managed IT Services provided to Sub Branches:

- Sustainability: RSL Queensland want to ensure that Sub Branches can continue to have access to IT Services that are cost effective, fit for purpose, secure and sustainable moving forward.
- Under-usage: A significant portion of the IT equipment issued to Sub Branches is not being used.

What Managed IT services options they are considering:

- Option 1: Self-Managed IT
- Option 2: Fully-Managed IT

What are the advantages and disadvantages of each option:

Advantages:

Option 1 – Partially Self-Managed IT:

- Can install third party software.
- More freedom in choice of hardware (e.g.: laptops and other support options).
- Partial IT Support team.

Disadvantage:

Option 1 – Partially Self-Managed IT:

- Hardware is not supported by IT Helpdesk.
- Significant disruption since transition period could take more than two year for the whole network.
- Reduced capability in RSL Queensland managing and preventing cyber security attacks.

Advantages:

Option 2 – Revised Fully-Managed IT:

- Full IT Support.
- Increased Cyber Security management and prevention
- Significant less disruption on Sub Branches since there will be no transition to self-management of IT equipment.

Disadvantage:

Option 2 – Revised Fully-Managed IT:

- Limitations on being able to install third party.
- Limitations in choice of hardware (e.g.: laptops).
- Standardised support model.

With regards to RSL Queensland IT management requirements we at Redlands RSL Sub Branch are self sufficient as we have our own business equipment, security systems and IT services. In addition we integrate with RSL QId IT needs and services very well.



This article was published recently by RSL Queensland on their website following a interview with Sean Mulqueen and myself (Ian Gray) at the 42 for 42 Afghanistan Memorial Gardens - Monument.

Sean Mulqueen President of 42 for 42 stated that "I thought it was a great opportunity to get veterans and their families involved so they could grieve but also pay their respects to those who had fallen. I wanted to ensure they felt a part of this project," Sean says.

"One of the uncles of the 41 fallen was our project manager, the landscape architect had done three tours of Afghanistan with the Special Forces, and even the mural artist had done artwork for veterans and Defence bases."

The construction process of the memorial garden took more than 14 working bees with volunteers from a variety of schools, organisations and community groups including Redlands RSL Sub Branch coming together.

"Every part of the build — the shovelling, planting, etc. — was done by veterans, families or anyone who wanted to get involved in these weekend working bees. We would normally set up a barbecue and make a morning out of it, which is where Redlands RSL Sub Branch helped us out a lot," Sean says.

"They've always been supportive of our organisation from the beginning, whether it be helping out at the working bees, attending our Annual Luncheons or events, or just being there to lend a hand or assistance if we needed some help.

"There's a trust between our organisations; we know they're always there to support us without forcing anything."

Redlands RSL Sub Branch Deputy President lan Gray says it was important to him that the Sub Branch supported the development of this garden.

"We take pride in how we support our fellow veteran community, and truly believe in the great cause 42 for 42 aspires to fulfil," Ian says.

"From their first Annual Luncheon in 2018, to the official opening of the memorial garden and beyond, we've made sure to always continue showing our support in whatever way we could."

While Redlands RSL Sub Branch continues to organise tours of the memorial garden for Sub Branch members, the space is also open for the public to visit, reflect and learn more about the Afghanistan conflict and those who lost their lives. 42 for 42 also offers tours of the space for groups of 10 or more.

"The garden was designed for all those who served; it's a place for people to reflect, and particularly, educate themselves on the sacrifices made during the Afghanistan conflict," Sean says.

I would encourage everyone who hasn't seen this memorial should do so. The memorial is located at Chippendale Street Milton next to Suncorp Stadium.

DATE	TITLE	EVENT	
3rd Oct 1992	Dedication, Australian Vietnam Veterans' National Memorial	The Vietnam Veterans' National Memorial, Anzac Parade, Canberra, was opened by the Prime Minister, the Hon. Paul Keating, MP, and honours those Australians who served and died in the war in Vietnam.	
5 Oct 1951	HMAS Sydney in Korean waters	The commencement of the aircraft carrier, HMAS Sydney's, first patrol off Korea's west coast made Australia the third country (after the USA and Britain) to operate a carrier in the Korean War. The carrier operated Firefly and Sea Fury aircraft (both types can be seen in the Memorial's Aircraft Hall).	
5 Oct 1951	Second Australian battalion committed to Korea	From September 1950 the main Australian army unit in Korea had been the 3rd Battalion, Royal Australian Regiment. The Australian Government annouced that the 1st Battalion, Royal Australian Regiment would join it in March 1952.	
9 Oct 1950	United Nations Forces advance into North Korea	Following the surprise landing at Inchon, behind North Korean lines, United nations forces rapidly pushed back the North Koreans and advanced deep into North Korea.	
10 Oct 1917	Battle of Poelcappelle, Western Front	Australian divisions continued to attack in the third battle of Ypres. The attack on Poelcappelle, launched amid heavy rain, was to cost 1250 casualties for no gain of ground.	
16 Oct 1967	Royal Australian Navy Helicopters deploy to Vietnam	An RAN Helicopter Flight Vietnam (RANHFV '67) joins the US Army's 135th Aviation Company at Vung Tau, supporting American troops in South Vietnam.	
19 Oct 1945	War Widow's Guild of Australia founded	The guild's first president was Mrs Jessie Vasey, widow of Major General G.A. Vasey. It is still an active organisation today. Major General Vasey was killed in an aircraft accident near Cairns while returning to operational service.	

DATE	TITLE	EVENT
21 Oct 1915	Australian Red Cross Missing and Wounded Enquiry Bureau established	Miss Vera Deakin, daughter of ex-Prime Minister Alfred Deakin, establishes the Australian Red Cross Missing and Wounded Enquiry Bureau in Cairo. The Missing and Wounded Enquiry Bureau handled many thousands of enquiries from Australian families seeking information on wounded and missing soldiers during the First World War.
21 Oct 1916	5th Australian Division on Western Front	The 5th Australian Division entered the front line near Flers on the Somme. By October the Somme battlefield was a waste of mud-bound craters. The troops' misery is depicted in the Somme Winter diorama in the Memorial's galleries.
21 Oct 1944	HMAS Australia damaged by Kamikaze aircraft	The Japanese first used special air units (Tokkō-tai) to undertake suicide attacks on warships in the Allied fleet supporting the American landings on Leyte in the Phillipines.
24 Oct 1942	Eora Creek, Kokoda Trail	The 16th Brigade, 7th Division, continued to drive the Japanese back along the Kokoda Trail but met heavy resistance at Eora Creek in late October.
27 Oct 1950	Chinese enter the Korean War	Having secretly moved at least 180,000 men into North Korea, Chinese forces began attacking south, surprising UN Command.
28 Oct 1916	First conscription referendum	Dismayed by heavy losses at Fromelles and Pozières on the Western Front, Prime Minister W.M. Hughes proposed that conscription be introduced for overseas service. The proposal was defeated.
30 Oct 1918	Armistice with Turkey	Armistice signed with Turkey, ending Turkish involvement in the First World War. Australian troops had taken a prominent part in the war against the Ottoman empire, especially on Gallipoli and in Sinai-Palestine.
31 Oct 1917	Beersheba, Palestine	At Beersheba the 4th Light Horse Brigade's bold charge against Turkish positions at Beersheba, seized a critical wells that enabled British empire forces to break the Ottoman line near Gaza and advance into Palestine.
