

President's Report

A Happy New Year to everyone, I hope this finds everyone in good health following an enjoyable Christmas. What a significant year this year is, the Centenary of our RSL Sub Branch.

Redlands RSL Sub Branch was formed at a meeting of veterans on the 11th May 1925, following the first Anzac Day commemorations the previous month. The newly elected committee of the sub branch immediately began fund raising to build a Memorial Hall to honour the 'Diggers' who did not return from the Great War and the motto: 'Honouring the Dead by Serving the Living' was born. The land, where our club now stands, was purchased in May 1926 and by 1928, plans for the Memorial Hall were drawn up. Harrold Wallis, a Gallipoli veteran, was engaged to build the Redlands Memorial Hall and it was completed and officially opened by the Prime Minister, Stanley Bruce, on the 28 August 1928.

Redlands RSL Sub-Branch has evolved since 1925 to become the largest sub branch in SED with over 1200 service members. The motto has moderated to: 'Honouring the Fallen by Serving the Living' and the Memorial Hall replaced by the Club that provides the best possible support for veterans through subsidised programs; while providing a high class, moderate cost, hospitality venue for the Redlands community.

We have the perfect oportunity to celebrate our achievements of the past 100 years by participating in the events planned for the year and collecting memorabilia as a momento. I hope as many of you as possible can participate in all, or at least some of these planned events.

GENERAL MANAGERS REPORT: As presented by Peter Harrison – General Manager

General Manager Peter Harrison presented his report and gave an update on the same period from last year, explaining that the figures are looking very good, even with September being one of our quietest gaming months of the year. Bottleshop sales are sitting just under \$150,000.00, is up 7% from last year, our Bar sales are \$2.2M is up 17% from last year, our Sails Restaurant are \$2.8M is up 8% from last year, Functions \$259,000.00 is up 7% from last year, Cove Café \$678,000.00 is up 32% from last year and climbing. Our net profit for the same period is sitting at \$564,000.00 which is 7.08% up on 2023, and we are up 119% on the budged forecast for 2024. We had budgeted \$200,000.00 for the last quarter, we have seen this slowing down in certain areas, gaming being the main area, food and beverages are holding their own. This is the second year in and our figures are still improving. We are hoping that we will continue to improve and have a good finish to the year.

Treasurer Greg Saunders gave a quick overview of the financials which are looking very good, the gaming did drop back a bit but still a very good result. The budget net profit of \$55,000.00 and we came in at \$75,000.00, show a \$20,500.00 increase which is a 37% increase on budget. When looking it on a day basis, it looks even better, when you are coming in 118% above budget. Since we have had Brent now doing functions, it has been trading really well, we had an actual \$28,000.00 against a budgeted \$23,000.00, before that it has been down, but we are now seeing great results. Community Grants were given out to 15 successful applicants and we gave out a total of \$38,000.00.

Bottle-Shop yearly sales were \$206,829.84 which is +8.22% on 2023.

Bar yearly sales were \$3,019,130.44 which is +17.15% on 2023.

Sails Bistro yearly sales were \$3,833,159.75 which is +7.75% on 2023.

Function yearly sales were \$412,709.45 which is +4.42% on 2023.

Coffee-shop yearly sales were \$915,107.16 which is +28.15% on 2023.

Keno yearly sales were \$ 2,132,538.60 which is - 0.17% on 2023.

Net Profit unaudited for 2024 is \$804,726.73 which is +33.37% on 2023.

Treasurer's Report

Where has 2024 gone! Very happy to report 2024 has been a very successful year financially at Redlands RSL. All figures contained in this report are yet to be audited.

At the end of 31st December 2024, on a Year to Date basis, Actual Net Profit \$804,726.73, with a Budget of \$435,158.00 with a Variance of \$369,568.73 which represents an 85% increase net profit to date. Based on last year an Actual of \$603,396.62, this represents an increase of \$201,330.12 or 33%.

Looking at the high performing cost centres year profits, Sails Restaurant Actual \$320,164.14, Budget \$102,636.00, Variance \$217,528.14 with a 212% increase. Bar trading Actual \$1,588,353.33, Budget \$1,190,993.00, and Variance \$397,360.33 with a 33% increase. Cove Café Actual \$107,186.53, Budget \$50,693.00, Variance \$56,493.53 or a 111% increase.

As we can see the foot traffic is telling the story.

League and Wellbeing expenditures totalled Actual \$1,432,416.59, Budget \$1,286,422.00, Variance \$145,994.59 with a 11% increase. To highlight some areas where the money was allocated, Anzac Day expenses \$90,521.63, Veteran & Wellbeing excursions \$3,894.67, Affiliated groups \$30,050.42, Golden Oldies \$19,754.58, Home Maintenance \$15,799.73, Cadet Units \$15,770.00, Volunteer Expenses \$8,762.36, Redlands RSL Community Grants \$37,397.88 and Other Donations \$16,166.77.

Overall, year-to-date, members' funds are \$31,851,478.40. The current asset total is \$3,493,512.32, and the current liabilities total is \$4,233,255.85. Our Bank Business loan liability is \$4,724,776.23. Our cash reserves remain resilient at \$1,510,136.89, and there is a further \$1,062,791.93 in Operational Funds.

We extend our heartfelt thanks to our dedicated team of volunteers for their incredible commitment to the veteran community. Your countless hours of effort across so many areas do not go unnoticed. Please know that your hard work is deeply appreciated and plays a vital role in the success of our operations—volunteers truly are our backbone.

I have confirmed with the Financial Controller that all statutory payments, including Employee Entitlements, are up to date, and no

statutory payments are under any repayment scheme.

Redlands RSL has once again brought joy to many children with our recent donations to the Redlands Hospital Children's Ward. This marks the sixth consecutive year that Redlands RSL has



provided Christmas gifts to the children a wonderful example of community involvement and support.

Deputy President & Cadets Report

In late December 2024 we held an AGM for the Australian War Animal Memorial Organisation and the committee was re-elected with just one change. I stood down as secretary but will remain on as Board member for another term. Peter Kotzur was duly elected secretary.

Nigel Allsopp the President of AWAMO, spoke about donations this past year to Sri Lanka, to assist wild life rangers, India, to assist elephants project effected by war, Australian special needs for the blind school and additional donations to Ukraine for animal welfare affected by war. In addition AWAMO is planing to spend \$10,000 to upgrade the Pozieres War Animal Memorial owing to damage caused by the harsh winters in the north of France.

I attended the Cadet Units last parade nights for the end of year 2024 and presented our RSL trophy for high achievement. Some cadets were promoted through the ranks and others received awards for achieving high standards on those nights.

As most would be aware, we have another VC recipient to be added to our military display adjacent to the coffee service area. The recipient is Pte Richard Norden, who served with 1 RAR and was awarded a VC Posthumously recently for his acts of gallantry during the battle of the Fire Support Base Cord in Vietnam on the 14/5/1968 on Operation

Toan Thang. Following his return home he joined the Australian Capital Territory Police service but sadly he died on duty in a 1972 motorcycle accident.



On Friday 20th December our Redlands Sub Branch was invited to attend RSL Queensland conference to be held at the Royal International Convention Centre at Gregory Terrace adjacent to the Royal Brisbane Show Ground. This conference called "RSL Qld Townhall" is a day for staff training with 400 staff members in attendance and the purpose was to advise staff of organisational updates. Our involvement was to take part in a panel of three hosted by John Hargreaves who is the head of development for RSL Qld. The subject matter was the 42 for 42 Afghanistan Memorial Project.

The panel consisted of Sean Mulqueen, President and founder of the 42 for 42 Afghanistan Memorial, Rupert McCall OAM a well renowned poet, author and presenter and myself representing Redlands RSL.

John Hargreaves started the panel by talking about the impact 42 for 42 has had on our community. Sean Mulqueen was first and was asked to give a brief background on the 42 for 42, the garden and the development of the project and provide what impact the memorial and garden has had on the veteran community.

Rupert McCall was asked what attracted him to support the 42 for 42 and what impact he had seen the 42 for 42 provide in the general community.

My question was how did Redlands RSL become involved in the 42 for 42 and how has memorial garden work done impacted veterans in your Sub Branch.

I advised the forum that our Sub Branch was contacted by Susan Chuck who is the Secretary of the 42 for 42 Origination and she asked if we would we like to assist in the project and we indicated we would. From the early onset of the development we assisted in working bees and attended the fundraising events held in the Gabba cricket ground function facility in May 2018 and later for the official opening at the Suncorp Stadium on 16th October 2021. Our Sub Branch continues to attend the fundraising events yearly since. The reason we were invited to attend was that we were the only Sub Branch which consistently attended the development from day one to present time.

We supported the cause in order to support our Afghanistan returned Veterans and to have a permanent place for family members and veterans to pay tribute to our fallen. Our Sub Branch has previously had bus trips to the Memorial Gardens and will do so in the future I am sure. The memorial garden is located behind the Anglican Church at Milton beside the Suncorp Stadium.

THIS MONTH IN AUSTRALIAN MILITARY



DATE	TITLE	EVENT
Jan 1969	Vietnam	Australian military commitment to Vietnam reaches a peak of 8,300 service personnel.
1 Jan 1901	Proclamation of the Commonwealth of Australia	The union of the six former colonies came into being with a proclamation by the Governor-General, Lord Hopetoun at Centennial Park Sydney.
1 Jan 1975	Office of Australian War Graves established	The Office is responsible for the maintenance of the graves of Australia's war dead in 78 countries around the world and in 76 war cemeteries within Australia.
5 Jan 1941	Bardia captured	The Australian 6th Division captured 40,000 Italian prisoners, including four generals, at a cost of 130 killed and 326 wounded in Australia's first major land battle of the Second World War.
5 Jan 1945	HMAS Australia damaged by Kamikaze aircraft	Australian ships were operating in support of United States amphibious landings in the Lingayen Gulf, Philippines when the Australia, for the second time in the war, became one of seven Allied ships to be struck by Kamikaze aircraft. 25 of her crew were killed and 30 wounded.
8 Jan 1952	RAAF launch first meteor rocket attack against ground forces	Meteors proved unsuitable in air-to-air combat against the superior MIGs and were reassigned to ground attack duties.
8 Jan 1958	Last Australian servicemen return from Korea	At the end of hostilities in Korea the peninsula remained divided between North and South. The war has yet to officially end.
9 Jan 1940	Australian Comforts Fund re-established	The Australian Comforts Fund (ACF), based on its First World War predecessor, raised money for comforts parcels for Australian service personnel in the field, clothing and the provision of meals and accommodation for men on leave.
9 Jan 1966	1st Battalion, Royal Australian Regiment, in Operation Crimp	The operation became the scene of a major action against a Viet Cong tunnel complex.
10 Jan 1942	Japanese air raid on Singapore	After their rapid advance through Malaya, Japanese forces paved the way for their invasion of Singapore with a series of air raids against the island.

DATE	TITLE	EVENT
11 Jan 1973	Cessation of hostilities in Vietnam by Australian forces	The proclamation by the Governor-General, Sir Paul Hasluck, ended 11 years of Australian involvement in Vietnam, the longest duration of any war in Australia's history.
14 Jan 1942	Gemas, Malaya	8th Division inflicts heavy casualties on Japanese in an ambush at Gemas in the first Australian contact with Japanese troops of the Second World War.
17 Jan 1917	4 Squadron, Australian Flying Corps sail for France	No. 4 Squadron was the final Australian Flying Corps squadron formed in the First World War. Its pilots flew Sopwith Camels over the Western Front beginning their active service in the battle of Cambrai.
17 Jan 1991	Coalition air attacks begin against Iraqi forces in Iraq and Kuwait	The first day of the Gulf War which ended when Iraqi forces were driven from Kuwait.
18 Jan 1919	Versailles Peace Conference opens	The Treaty of Versailles, signed between Germany and representatives of 27 victorious powers punished Germany territorially and financially for her role in the First World War. The treaty was supposed also to prevent Germany from having the means to make war in the future.
24 Jan 1967	First contact at Bien Hoa, South Vietnam	Fighting at Bien Hoa involved a series of contacts between units of the 1st Australian Task Force and communist forces in the area of the Bien Hoa - Long Binh complex near Saigon. Australian and American units sought to dominate the area and prevent enemy rocket attacks on nearby military bases and installations.
25 Jan 1942	Japanese land at Lae	Japanese forces sought to capture Lae in order to build a forward air base for the defence of Rabaul and for attacks on northern Australia and New Guinea
25 Jan 1942	Full mobilisation ordered in Australia	The threat of a Japanese invasion and the proximity of Japanese forces to Australia demanded an increased commitment from the Government and public.
25 Jan 1952	Last day of HMAS Sydney's service in the Korean war	HMAS Sydney had served in Korean waters since August 1951. The carrier had operated Firefly and Sea Fury aircraft (both types can be seen in the Memorial's Aircraft Hall).
26 Jan 1945	Beginning of Sandakan death march, Borneo	Sandakan prisoner of war camp was established by the Japanese in July 1942. Fearing invasion from Allied forces, Japanese troops marched the prisoners inland to Ranau in January 1945. Many of the prisoners died of malnutrition, exhaustion, disease and ill-treatment and the survivors were shot when they reached their destination. Only six out of 2,500 Australian and British prisoners sent to Sandakan survived.
