

President's Report

I hope this finds everyone in good health as our Centenary year continues.

When Prime Minister, Stanley Bruce, officially opened the Redlands RSL Memorial Hall on the 28 August 1928, it was broadcast over the radio, the first live radio broadcast from the Redlands. The Hall became a focal point for all local activities and the relief of distress among returned servicemen was a priority. Each year the Diggers held their annual ball; and it was also the venue for the Redlands Show Ball and home to many local charities. The hall was well used for balls, fetes, weddings and community events. In 1934, a civic reception was held for Prince Henry, Duke of Gloucester, on his visit to Australia.

At the outbreak of WWII, a massive meeting of members from the Redlands Sub Branch, organised a deputation, probably the first from a sub branch, to approach Queensland Branch to form a Volunteer Defence Corps. During World War II, the Memorial Hall was used extensively for fundraising activities and on August 15, 1945, it was the venue for end-of-war celebrations. At the end of 1945, the hall was used for a 'welcome home' party for returned service personnel.

During the month we received excellent news with the announcement of an Australia Day Achievement Medallion from the RSL of Australia, awarded to Deputy President, Ian Gray. I am sure everyone joins me in congratulating Ian on this prestigious award. I was honoured to be present when SED President, Kerrie Gallagher, presented the award. The ever so humble Ian thanked all the wonderful support from our Board, the Sub Branch and all the volunteers, as being responsible for the award. Ian, you thoroughly earned this award with your tireless volunteer workload over many, many years.

Mission to Seafarers Overview

- Operating in the Port of Brisbane since 1892.
- · Provides physical, social, and spiritual services to seafarers.
- Supports mental health, communication, and social needs of a largely international workforce.

 Facilities include club rooms, chaplains, recreational activities, and internet access.

Modern Challenges in Maritime Industry

- Isolation: Long contracts (9–11 months for crew, 4–6 months for officers), often without internet.
- Diversity: Multinational crews face cultural and language barriers.
- Hazards: Harsh weather, piracy, and criminalization in the event of accidents.
- Decline in Australian Fleet: Limited domestic ships; most seafarers now from countries like the Philippines, India, and Ukraine.

Impact and Outreach

- · Facilitates reunions for families of seafarers.
- Offers mental health support during crises such as onboard injuries or deaths.
- Addresses environmental concerns, such as ballast water exchange.

Port of Brisbane and Australia's Maritime Reliance

- Third-largest port in Australia, with \$60 billion in annual trade.
- Vital supply chain hub, underscoring Australia's vulnerability to disruptions in maritime trade.

Call for Volunteers

- Mission requires volunteers for activities like bus driving, ship visits, and hospitality.
- Post-COVID volunteer numbers have significantly decreased.

Broader Insights

- Importance of maritime trade in everyday life (e.g., imported goods, fuel).
- Global concerns, including piracy (e.g., Houthi rebels) and logistical disruptions.

Treasurer's Report

After a very successful trading year for 2024 we have started 2025 in the same vein. As at the 31st January 2025 actual net profit is \$146,126.72, against a budget \$17,209.00, variance \$128,917.72. The stand out performance for the month was Cove Café with a net profit \$10,325.85 which represents a \$4,208.85 on budget or 69%.

League and Wellbeing expenditures totalled \$132,810.93. To highlight some of the areas where the money was allocated, Cadet units \$4,500.00, Members Amenities \$52,081.31 and Anzac Day expenditure \$27,500.00.

Our overall member funds as at the end of January 2025 are \$31,997,605.12, the current asset total \$3,819,798.30, the current liabilities \$3,141,545.81, our non-current liabilities bank business loan is \$4,616,117.49, our cash returns remain resilient at \$1,615,010.70 and there is a further \$1,424,765.67 in operational funds.

One of the highlights of the year is Anzac Day. In the Redlands we can get crowds of 10,000 plus to the dawn and main services. Redlands RSL is proud and honoured to support this day in honour of our fallen and veterans. The total cost to stage this event will be in excess of \$90,000.00.

I have confirmed with the Financial Controller that all statutory payments, including employee entitlements are up to date and no statutory payments are under any repayment scheme.

Once again, it's so pleasant to return such a good Treasurers report to start the year off. Redlands RSL certainly is delivering to the members, veterans and local community.

These activities are designed to challenge cadets, develop their

resilience, and enhance their trustworthiness and loyalty to one another and the organisation.

The unit's influence and achievements extend far beyond its training activities. In December, the Officer Commanding, Captain Golle, was honoured to attend a Defence Forum at the Lota RSL, hosted by federal member Henry Pike. This event highlighted the strong relationships 136 ACU maintains within the Defence and wider community, further cementing its role as a vital capability of the Australian Army Cadet Corps.

217 SQUADRON, AUSTRALIAN AIR FORCE

217 Squadron Australian Air Force Cadet (AAFC) unit reports 2024 was a successful year for Squadron. 217SQN has always been a strong supporter of the

Redland City community, and 2024 was no different, 217SQN cadets helped raised urgently needed funds for Legacy and participated in other community events, such as the Rotary's Bookfest, whilst also attending Redlands RSL ANZAC Day and Redlands Vietnam Veteran's Day.

March 2024- 217SQN conducted a training day for SQN's new recruits to consolidate and finalise the Orientation phase of their learning

Cadets took part in drill, cadet skills, and collaborative team-building activities, designed to foster communication, problem-solving, and teamwork. This activity is an opportunity for cadets to develop their personal growth and leadership capabilities. Also, in March 217SQN conducted a training weekend for our Leading cadets transitioning to Cadet Corporals (CCPL). The aim of the activity is for LCDT's to participate in Cadet Corporal personal development and leadership training activities, where cadets develop their skills with planning and navigating, aircraft aerodynamics and also further developing and refining their drill capability across a range of movements, all the cadets successfully completed the course and were promoted to the rank of Cadet Corporal.

April 2024- we again saw 217SQN cadets attend the Redlands ANZAC Day 2024 Dawn Service and went on to participate in the Redland City Main Service.

May 2024- 217SQN cadets experienced a Cadet Aviation Experience (CAE) or Pilot Experience (PEX) flights depending on their experience/ time in cadets. The weekend was split into 4 sessions, Saturday AM, Saturday PM, Sunday AM and Sunday PM. Cadets travelled to RAAF Base Amberley to complete the activity; Cadet Aviation Experience (CAE) flights are intended to provide cadets who join the AAFC with an opportunity to experience flight in a light aircraft. The CAE is an interactive flight for cadets (who are passengers) in a light aircraft, observing and communicating with the pilot on various facets of the flight. In many cases, this may be the first opportunity a cadet may have to fly in a light aircraft, and it is designed to be one which inspires an interest in aviation. This is for cadets in their first year, however more experienced cadets can be offered this experience.

Cadets also took part in PEX flights, which are intended to provide cadets who join the AAFC with an opportunity to experience what it is like to operate an aircraft under the instruction of a qualified instructor in a light aircraft. This is a hands-on flight lesson. For cadets that could not attend the May CAE/PEX activity, the activity was again offered to cadets in November.

June 2024- some cadets attended the PCYC Cadet games involving ADF, Emergency Services, and Community cadet organisations. 217SQN's team of cadets and staff experienced areas such as command, excellence in skill, teamwork, leadership, and camaraderie, for the title of Ultimate Cadet Crew in 2024. 217SQN may not have won the prize, however the experience was a great learning curve for cadets that attended.

August 2024- Cadets from 217SQN, 220SQN (Clayfield) and 215SQN (Carindale) participated in a Joint Field Exercise at Karingal Scout Campsite to improve their navigation, fieldcraft and radio communication skills. Further during August 217SQN AAFC supported the Redlands RSL in participating in Redlands Vietnam Veteran's Day.

October 2024- 217SQN cadets attended a leadership development course where cadets from the Training Group 5 cadets attempted various team-based challenges such as: obstacle crossings, first aid and casualty evacuation, Map Reading, navigation and survival scenarios. The weekend was by all accounts, full of fun and excitement, good learning experiences, and by staff accounts, was a successful outcome.

November 2024- the Squadron celebrated at our end of year Graduation Parade, with some 30 cadets being reclassified to Leading Cadet and some 21 Leading Cadets promoted to Cadet Corporals.

Over the years, 217SQN has been a breeding ground for many young pilots. During December/January holidays, 217SQN had several of our cadets attended Glider Pilot training for new and continuing students. This training will be continuing through 2025.

TS NORFOLK AUSTRALIAN NAVY CADET UNIT

By far the busiest for TS Norfolk and the ANC. With the implementation of the new Cadet Youth Development Continuum (CYDC) cadets are further engaged with the program as they learn such skills as Drone flying, power boating, sailing, drumming and first aid.

Cadets have more control and more responsibility for their learning and development especially their promotion task books. As a result, 34 promotions were awarded (including 2 to Petty Officer). We start 2025 with 4 Petty Officers — one being considered for promotion to Chief Petty Officer at present, with another to be promoted to Chief later this year.

In 2024, we received 14 new cadets to the ship's company through

our continual community engagements and presence in the Redlands Area. We continually welcome the invitations to participate in the RSI's Anzac Day, Vietnam Veterans and Remembrance Day services. Annually, the cadets and staff take part in the Wellington Point Christmas Markets and enjoyed the invitation to the 95 Wing Ceremony and flypast. Before our first parade we received 12 expressions of interest with 11 joining the ship's company, one transferring to TS Diamantina.

2025 will be an equally busy year to commemorate the 110th anniversary of Anzac Day. TS Norfolk has already received invitations to various ceremonies in the community and an increase in cadet participation at school ceremonies.

THIS MONTH IN AUSTRALIAN MILITARY



DATE	TITLE	EVENT
2 Feb 1942	First Japanese air attack on Port Moresby	The Japanese had hoped to occupy Port Moresby as a base from which to cut off shipping to Eastern Australia. Their defeat in the Battle of the Coral Sea thwarted the planned naval attack and invasion against Port Moresby.
3 Feb 1943	Australians counter-attack at Wau	Having failed to take Wau the Japanese were forced into retreat. At the end of the fighting some 1,200 Japanese had been killed as had some 300 Australians.
4 Feb 1945	Yalta Conference	Conference between President Roosevelt, Marshal Stalin and Prime Minister Churchill to determine the shape of post-war Europe.
8 Feb 1942	Japanese invade Singapore	Singapore was believed to be an impregnable fortress but the Japanese advance from the Malayan Peninsula proved the falsity of this belief.
10 Feb 1954	Queen Elizabeth at Macquarie Place, Sydney	Queen Elizabeth II and Prince Philip each plant a Plane tree at Macquarie Place, Sydney to mark the beginning of the Remembrance Driveway between Canberra and Sydney.
12 Feb 1940	First convoy of Second AIF reaches the Middle East	Australia's first land campaign of the Second World War took place in North Africa against the Italians.
13 Feb 1946	Main Australian contingent of BCOF sailed for Japan from Morotai	Australian personnel played a prominent role in the British Commonwealth Occupation Force in Japan at the conclusion of the Second World War in the Pacific. They were allotted the devastated Hiroshima Prefecture on the island of Honshu.
13 Feb 1965	First Australian SAS Squadron advance party departs for Borneo	The SAS served in Borneo during Confrontation to gather intelligence, conduct reconnaissance patrols and collect information on topography.
14 Feb 1942	SS Vyner Brooke sunk	The Vyner Brooke, carrying 65 Australian nurses and other refugees from Singapore, was sunk by Japanese aircraft one day after leaving the island. The survivors made their way to Banka Island where one group of nurses were massacred by their Japanese captors. Only Sister Vivian Bullwinkel survived the massacre.
15 Feb 1942	Fall of Singapore	Over 15,000 Australians taken prisoner by the Japanese on Singapore. For both Britain and Australia this was a terrible military defeat.

DATE	TITLE	EVENT
18 Feb 1941	Australian troops arrive in Singapore	Australia recognised that Singapore was vital to its own defence, without the island the British fleet had no suitable base for operations in the South East Asia. The 8th Division was sent to bolster the island's defence in the event of Japan's entering the war.
19 Feb 1915	Allied warships shell Dardanelles	This was the first allied attempt to force a passage through the Dardanelles and attack the heart of the Ottoman Empire. Its failure ultimately led to the ill-fated Gallipolli campaign.
19 Feb 1942	First Japanese air raid on Darwin	The city was bombed 64 times between February 1942 and November 1943.
20 Feb 1942	Japanese land in Portuguese Timor	The Japanese landing in Portuguese Timor heralded the beginning of a long and gruelling guerilla campaign waged by elements of the Australian 2/2nd Independent Company with the support of friendly Timorese.
21 Feb 1956	Australian and British aircraft bomb Kluang, Malaya	The raid was staged against the jungle base of the 7th Independent Platoon, Malayan Races Liberation Army in Central Johore and was carried out by Lincolns of No. 1 Squadron RAAF and Canberras of No. 12 Squadron RAF. It wiped out the camp and was regarded as the most successful of the 4,000 sorties flown by the Australians in Malaya.
23 Feb 1956	1 Squadron RAAF bomb Communist camps near Kuala Lumpur during the Malayan Emergency	1 Squadron flew Lincoln bombers during the Malayan Emergency.
26 Feb 1943	End of fighting at Wau	The Japanese recognised that Allied possession of Wau posed a significant threat to important Japanese bases at Lae and nearby Salamaua and sought to take the town. They were defeated after weeks of heavy fighting.
27 Feb 1942	Battle of Java Sea	In two separate actions off the coast of Surabaya involving heavy losses in Allied shipping. HMAS Perth was involved in the battle and was one of the few allied ships to survive. The action delayed Japanese landings in Java by only one day.
28 Feb 1991	Gulf War ends	With Iraqi forces having been driven from Kuwait and defeated in the field the coalition forces called a halt to the fighting.
29 Feb 1972	HMAS Sydney arrives at Vung Tau	On this voyage Sydney embarked 457 soldiers. HMAS Sydney made 21 voyages to Vietnam during the war.
