President's Report

I hope this finds everyone in good health with minimal property damage and power outage after Tropical Cyclone Alfred. A touch of irony that we should experience a cyclone in our Centenary year.

More sub branch historical events occurred in 1995 when the new club construction was in progress and in 1996 the last Anzac Day commemorations were held in the Memorial Hall. The new club building was occupied in early 1997 and officially opened on the 19th April by State President, Eric Kay OAM. The old Sub Branch Memorial Hall was relocated next to the Redlands Museum in Cleveland where it remains today.

In 2000, Redland Shire Council and the RSL announced plans to buy Cleveland's former police station and courthouse and turn them into a war memorial precinct and museum. On 25th January 2002 Redlands Services Club received a new charter and resulted in a new name change. On 1st July 2002 Redland RSL Sub Branch absorbed the Redlands Services Club and became Redlands RSL Sub Branch Inc. In 2005, refurbishment of the old police station and courthouse was completed and the Welfare and Sub Branch office occupied the Police Station and the Library Museum began in the Courthouse.

In the years since, several renovations to the club were undertaken to cater for a growing membership. These included the addition of a 3 story car park and increased capacity to the Kitchens, Restaurant and Function areas to create the Club precinct we have today.

Now back to the present where the next two months will be busy times on the Sub Branch calendar. Monday 24th February was War Animals Memorial Day and Redlands RSL held a small memorial service in Anzac Memorial Park to commemorate the sacrifices that animals endured in all wars.

Anzac Day is fast approaching and Michael McDonnell has been planning this special day in our centenary year for some months. It is now time to advise him if you are laying a wreath or require transport

in a golf cart. Volunteers will also be required in the lead up to Anzac Day to sell memorabilia and to attend services at schools and aged care facilities.

Treasurer's Report

The Redlands RSL continues to trade well and is certainly in positive territory from a sales and net profit perspective.

At the end of February 2025, our financials are as follows on a Year-to-date basis. Actual Net Profit \$220,722, with a Budget \$50,843 with a variance of \$169,879.

Looking at some of the top performing cost centres February, Bar Net Profit \$127,043, Budget \$104,245, and Variance \$22,798 with a 22% increase. Sails Restaurant Net Profit \$23,618, Budget \$10,637, Variance \$12,981 with a 122% increase, Cove Café Net Profit \$10,903, Budget \$5,553, Variance \$5,350 with a 96% increase.

League and Wellbeing expenditures totalled \$123,711. To highlight some areas where the money was allocated, Anzac Day Expense \$12,500, League Donations \$5,000 (Ingham RSL), Honour the Fallen \$2,550, Joint Venture \$1,007, Golden Oldies \$1,643, Home Maintenance \$1,655, Member Amenities \$44,897, League Bus Expenses \$844, and Donations - Cadet Units \$4.681.

Overall, year-to-date, members' funds are \$32,072,201. The current asset total is \$3,344,502, and the current liabilities total is \$2,679,984. Our Non-Current Liabilities Bank Business loan is \$4,506,835. Our cash reserves remain resilient at \$1,619,910, and there is a further \$981,608 in Operational Funds.

Redlands RSL Dave Whitehead Memorial Annual Charity Golf Day on Friday, February 21st 2025, was held at the Carbrook Golf Club. Organised by Peter Harrison, this highly anticipated event is primarily supported and attended by our valued suppliers, whose generous contributions fund the initiative. All proceeds from the event were donated to charitable organisations, with this year's beneficiaries—42 for 42, Night Ninjas, and Cleveland Meals on Wheels—each receiving \$3,000. This annual event exemplifies Redlands RSL's ongoing commitment to supporting the community and veterans. Once again, the day was a huge success. We extend our sincere gratitude to Peter Harrison for his dedication and being the driving force behind the event.

I have confirmed with the Financial Controller that all statutory payments, including Employee Entitlements, are up to date, and no statutory payments are under any repayment scheme.

After two trading months of 2025 the Redlands RSL is in a very solid

position, it is becoming increasingly apparent what an asset the car park is yet another jump on our opposition.

Members, I previously indicated that I would be standing down at this AGM however, I advised our board that it is my intention to continue to serve as I have unfinished projects such as Honour Our Fallen, School projects bookings and School ANZAC Day Services. In addition I want to be present at our 100th celebrations of this Sub Branch.

The month started with preparations for Annual reports from all departments due later this month in preparation for our AGM. The three Cadets Units have provided their reports in a timely manner for the pending AGM.

Later this month I will be providing the three Cadet Unit Commanders with the run sheets and maps for Anzac Day arrangements. This year is our 100th year for our Sub Branch and as a result our Anzac Day co-ordinating team have arranged for 95 Wing from Amberley RAAF Base to perform Catafalque Party for Dawn and main service. Our Cadet Units will perform an honour guard for both services as well.

The 24th February was War Animal Day. This year we had the pleasure to have the President and Founder of "Honour Our Fallen Origination" Richard McCarthy OAM attend our service and lay a wreath for War Animal Day. On behalf of Australian War Animal Memorial Organisation, Rachel Ezzy laid a wreath, as well as our President Rob Wilson and others. I gave an address on the roll animals played in war from WW1 to the present day.

In WW1 a messenger pigeon named Cher Ami (Dear Friend) saved the lives of 194 American servicemen and as a result received Croix de Guerre by the French. This medal is for bravery. During WW2 the Dickin Medal was awarded to animals who displayed outstanding gallantry for service in wartime. The medal was awarded 74 times since 1943. The recipients comprise of 37 dogs, 32 pigeons, 4 horses and 1 cat. The Dickin Medal is the animal equivalent to the Victoria Cross for bravery..

136 AUSTRALIAN ARMY CADET UNIT

136 ACU Conducts Cadet Development Activity at Gallipoli Barracks Enoggera

136 Australian Cadet Unit (ACU) is set to conduct an essential training activity at Gallipoli Barracks Enoggera, focusing on the Cadet Development Continuum (CDC) 1 Alpha. This important exercise, titled Exercise Shakeout, will provide cadets with a hands-on opportunity to apply section-level operations, allowing them to bridge the gap between theoretical knowledge and practical proficiency.

During the activity, cadets will be introduced to the Weapons Training Simulation System (WTSS) facility, where they will engage with the EF88 rifle and the Light Support Weapon (LSW). This training will enhance their weapon handling and tactical skills in a simulated environment, preparing them for real-world applications.

In addition to weapons training, the unit will also conduct the annual swim test, an essential requirement for building physical endurance

and aquatic skills. Cadets will further challenge their teamwork and physical resilience by participating in the over-water obstacle course, an activity designed to promote camaraderie and trust within the unit.

Exercise Shakeout will also serve as a key opportunity for staff to reestablish the unit's battle rhythm, validate instructional content, and ensure that all training is delivered effectively. This comprehensive program aims to develop cadets into capable and confident individuals ready to face future challenges.

TS NORFOLK AUSTRALIAN NAVY CADET UNIT

By far the busiest for TS Norfolk and the ANC. With the implementation of the new Cadet Youth

Development Continuum (CYDC) cadets are further engaged with the program as they learn such skills as Drone flying, power boating, sailing, drumming and first aid. Cadets have more control and more responsibility for their learning and development especially their promotion task books. As a result, 34 promotions were awarded (including 2 to Petty Officer). We start 2025 with 4 Petty Officers — one being promoted to Chief Petty Officer at time of writing this article, with another to be promoted to Chief later this year.

In 2024, we received 14 new cadets to the ship's company through our continual community engagements and presence in the Redlands Area. We continually welcome the invitations to participate in the RSI's Anzac Day, Vietnam Veterans and Remembrance Day services. Annually, the cadets and staff take part in the Wellington Point Christmas Markets and enjoyed the invitation to the 95 Wing Ceremony and flypast. Before our first parade we received 12 expressions of interest with 11 joining the ship's company, one transferring to TS Diamantina.

Our maritime activities have already commenced with activities booked over the coming weeks, with a combined maritime day with TS Moreton Bay, TS Diamantina & TS Vengeance planned just after Easter.

In December 2024 saw the first Tri-Flotilla & tri-Service specialist and

promotion activity. With 170 cadets attending making this the largest activity in Flotilla history. 11 cadets from TS Norfolk attended and will be receiving their elective badges next month I would like to take the opportunity to thank the Redlands RSL board and members for their support and generosity and we look forward to working with our community in 2025.

TS Norfolk is recruiting new cadets who are turning 13 this year to age 18.

THIS MONTH IN AUSTRALIAN MILITARY

DATE	TITLE	EVENT
1 Mar 1901	Naval and military forces of the States transferred to Commonwealth control	With Federation state and federal authorities began planning for the establishment of federal military forces.
2 Mar 1943	Battle of Bismarck Sea begins	A Japanese convoy of eight transport ships and eight escorting destroyers was almost annihilated by Allied air attacks as they attempted to reinforce the garrison at Lae. Of the 6,000 Japanese troops bound for Lae only 2,890 survived.
3 Mar 1942	Broome and Wyndham bombed	The Japanese air raid on Broome came when the port was crowded with refugees fleeing the Japanese invasion of the Netherlands East Indies. About 70 people, including many civilians are thought to have been killed in the raid. Japanese Attacks on Wyndham focused on the town's aerodrome.
7 Mar 1942	Japanese occupation of Java complete	Allied forces offered little resistance to the Japanese invasion of Java, the former Dutch colony fell to the Japanese 16th Army on 12 March.
8 Mar 1942	Japanese land at Lae and Salamua	Lae and Salamaua were occupied by the Japanese to provide defensive depth for their important air and sea base at Rabaul.
9 Mar 1942	7th Division AIF arrives in Adelaide	Leading brigade of the 7th Division AIF arrives in Adelaide from the Middle East. Elements of the Division had been sent to Java where they soon became prisoners of the Japanese.
11 Mar 1845	First Maori War	British troops based in Australia were sent to suppress an uprising by Maoris who were unhappy at the continuing expansion of European settlement in New Zealand's North Island.
12 Mar 1900	Australians arrive at Bloemfontein, South Africa	Members of the New South Wales Mounted Rifles, under Lord Roberts, reached Bloemfontein, the capital of the Orange Free State, under Roberts' strategy of taking the war into the Boer Republics.
13 Mar 1943	Japanese reconnaissance flight over Darwin	In addition to the 64 air raids on Darwin the Japanese made numerous reconnaissance flights over northern Australia.
14 Mar 1942	Horn Island bombed	Japanese bomb Horn Island, Torres Strait. Horn Island, in the Torres Strait, was the main tactical base for Allied air operations in the Torres Strait. The island was subject to nine Japanese air raids during the Second World War.

DATE	TITLE	EVENT
15 Mar 1940	First two women from the Voluntary Aid Detachments organisation enlist in the AIF	Most Voluntary Aids transferred after August 1942 into the new Australian Army Women's Medical Service. Over 200 Voluntary Aids served in the Middle East and Ceylon during the Second World War.
16 Mar 1942	Darwin bombed	Darwin was subject to 64 Japanese air raids during the Second World War.
17 Mar 1942	General MacArthur flies to Darwin	Having left the Philippines after the Japanese invasion, General MacArthur was appointed to command the newly created South West Pacific Area. Australia became the base from which he would launch offensive action against the Japanese in the Pacific.
20 Mar 1916	ANZAC Corps land in France	With Gallipoli behind them the bulk of Australia's forces were now sent to France where the terrible fighting on the Western Front awaited.
20 Mar 2003	Iraq War	Australian military forces, as part of the US-led coalition, commence operations as part of the invasion of Iraq.
21 Mar 1942	Air battle for Port Moresby begins	The Japanese had hoped to occupy Port Moresby as a base from which to cut off shipping to Eastern Australia. Their defeat in the Battle of the Coral Sea thwarted the planned naval attack and invasion against Port Moresby.
22 Mar 1942	Japanese aircraft bomb Katherine	This was the only air raid against Katherine in the Second World War, one man was killed.
24 Mar 1942	Port Moresby bombed by Japanese	The Japanese had hoped to occupy Port Moresby as a base from which to cut off shipping to Eastern Australia. Their defeat in the Battle of the Coral Sea thwarted the planned naval attack and invasion against Port Moresby.
26 Mar 1917	First Battle of Gaza begins	This was the first Allied attempt to capture this major Turkish centre lying 32 kilometres inside the border of Palestine. The Allied strength included two Australian Light Horse Brigades and the ANZAC Mounted Division under Major General Harry Chauvel.
27 Mar 1944	First Victory Loan	Australian Government launches first Victory Loan aimed at raising £150 million for the war effort. Twelve major Government war loans were offered to the Australian public during the Second World War.
31 Mar 1921	Formation of the Australian Air Force	In Australia negotiations between Army, Navy and Defence officials from 1917 to 1921 resulted in the Australian Air Force being formed on 31 March 1921, with approval to use the 'Royal' prefix granted on 13 August 1921.
