Subsequently, Mr. Heath Fulton withdrew his nomination for the Deputy President position, and the election process proceeded accordingly.

Voting slips were distributed, and members were instructed to strike through Mr. Heath Fulton's name. Members were then asked to raise their hands to confirm their eligibility to vote. It was further clarified that each member should place a single tick next to a candidate's name, as a second vote would be conducted for the subsequent position.

PRESIDENT'S ANNUAL REPORT 2025

TO ALL MEMBERS

I begin this report with a tribute to our long serving Deputy President, Mr Ian Gray who sadly passed early this year. Ian was a stalwart at Redlands RSL for almost 25 years and could be relied upon at all times. A humble volunteer who always went the extra mile and put his hand up for anything. When Ian decided to complete his full term as Deputy President early in our Centenary Year rather than retire, he did so for the benefit of the sub branch. Above all, Ian was a true gentleman, respected by all, both within this sub branch and elsewhere, and a role model to many. The attendance at his funeral early this year was a testament to how much he was loved and respected. Lest We Forget.

Our Centenary Year 2025, began early with a visit by staff from RSL QLD News to interview members for the story published in Edition 1. Then on 12th March, Her Excellency the Honourable Dr Jeanette Young, Governor of Queensland, honoured the Redlands RSL Sub Branch with an official visit to commemorate the Centenary of the Sub Branch's founding. As part of the occasion, Her Excellency, accompanied by her husband, Professor Graeme Nimmo, laid a wreath at the ANZAC Memorial Park Monument. The Sub Branch Centenary Luncheon on 18th May was enjoyed by many, particularly the presentation by our Guest Speaker, Mr Col Sutcliffe OAM. My personal thanks for the leadership of General Manager, Peter Harrison, his management team and dedicated staff, who consistently provide a high class, moderate cost, hospitality venue for the Veterans and the Redlands community. The venue completed operations in 2025 with only minor interruptions for improvements and recorded another record year of trading, despite the continuing cost of living crisis and increasing nearby competition. This enabled around \$1.4 million support for our Advocacy, Wellbeing and Commemorative programs for our veterans and community grants.

It is vitally important to acknowledge our hard-working Advocates, Debbie Lake, Julie Collins and Doug Stockwell, who not only provide advocacy and processed claims for our sub branch members, but others nearby. To the Headquarters support staff, Jeanette Markley, Rachel Page, Tatiana Whare, Elissa Forster, Nicole Dooley and Alisa Mathot, thank you for your support throughout the year and making our job easier.

Volunteers are the lifeblood of all RSL Sub Branches, regardless of size. The volunteers here at Redlands are no different, contributing 9998 volunteer hours in 2025, doing a range of services for the veterans and the sub branch. Your dedication to 'wanting to make a difference' is greatly appreciated. Thank you all for sparing your time, no matter how small.

Membership of Redlands RSL again passed 30,000 in 2025 to a record high of 30,830 financial members. Service membership reached 1223 during the year. Thanks to all the members, your support throughout the year was invaluable.

TREASURER'S REPORT 2025

When I seconded the Treasurer's Report at the Annual General Meeting in March 2025, I had absolutely no idea that within 4 months I would be appointed Treasurer of Redlands RSL Sub Branch. I thank and congratulate Greg Saunders for the excellent work he did as the previous Treasurer.

I was extremely fortunate to assume responsibility for the role of Treasurer on the Redlands RSL Sub-Branch Incorporated. I was, however, cognisant of the business acumen and community commitment of the committee members on the organisation I was joining. I was obviously aware the organisation had had a long term, industry respected General Manager, surrounded by highly trained industry professionals, with vision and having strong community ethics, managing the daily activities.

The trading figures for the financial year to 31st December 2025 have been audited by our appointed auditors Grant Thornton Audit Pty Ltd. A comprehensive summary of the report appears towards the back of this Annual Report. I am extremely pleased to report the net profit for the year was \$1,320,505 representing an increase of 64% on 2024. The members funds rose to a new record figure of \$33,171,982. Upon thorough examination of the annual figures, I am extremely pleased to inform members that that your club continues to operate in a highly acceptable manner.

Despite the disruptions throughout alterations to Cove Café, the growth during the year in all trading areas was excellent. Once all figures were collated in fact the results across all areas were the best ever recorded by the organisation. A wonderful outcome achieved by hardworking employees supervised by dedicated Management teams.

League and Wellbeing is the most important area of expenditure within Redlands RSL. It is within this cost centre, funds are sourced to assist our veterans. A total of \$1,504,541 was spent via the League and Wellbeing area. The major items of expenditure include ANZAC Day \$97,460, Cadet units \$14,172, Community Grants \$37,634, Other Donations \$11,359, Golden Oldies \$19,677, Home Maintenance \$18,575, Affiliated Groups \$34,793, Wellbeing \$13,561 and Communication to Veterans \$13,327.

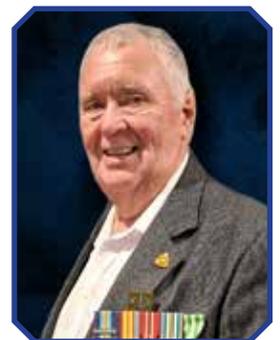

WELLBEING REPORT 2025

It is my pleasure to present the 2025 annual Wellbeing Report of the Redlands RSL Sub Branch Inc.

Advocacy

Redlands RSL Sub Branch dedicated Advocates Debbie and Julie have worked tirelessly throughout the past twelve months to provide clients with support in completing and lodging claims with the Department of Veteran Affairs for the most positive outcome for their clients. They have been ably assisted by Jeanette and Doug with research and endless paperwork that this process involves.

Volunteers

The Redlands RSL Sub Branch has sixty-two volunteers who assist our veteran community. This includes 20 Wellbeing Support Officers who assist our Veteran Community when requested.

The Wellbeing Support Officers meet each month to discuss and share information and endeavour to have a guest speaker talk to us to provide information to assist our veteran community.

Upon request from families of veterans, a Poppy Service is conducted by a representative of Redlands RSL Sub Branch at the funeral of the veteran. During 2025, 20 Poppy Services were conducted.

Volunteers also assist in our Library/Museum, attend School and Commemoration services when requested, visit veterans at home or in hospital, sell Anzac and Remembrance Day badges in the local shopping centre, and any others tasks that we carry out on request.

Commemorations

ANZAC Day, Remembrance Day, Vietnam Veterans Day and Australian War Animal Memorial Day are commemorated each year.

Service members were also invited to Anzac Day Commemorations at 24 district schools and 4 nursing homes. Remembrance Day saw 1,310 Poppy donations made to nursing homes and the local community.

Volunteers also sell badges at local shopping centre before Anzac and Remembrance Days.

Vets Cuppa

The Vets cuppa is held every second Wednesday in the month, where, for \$5.00, veterans can purchase a cuppa with either a muffin or a scone with jam and cream. The numbers that attend have grown considerably since the inception. Thank you to staff who assist our veterans each month.

Volunteers Health Week

This is sponsored by the Department of Veteran Affairs who, on application, provide a grant to run a themed event usually in October. This year we gratefully received a grant and organised a day trip to the Maleny Botanic Gardens and Bird World with lunch at the Nambour RSL.

Golden Oldies

The golden oldies group began over ten years ago to assist with social isolation in our Community.

The majority of the attendees are service members or their widows. They meet every 2nd Tuesday, have cuppa on arrival and either a guest speaker or entertainment, then sandwiches and a cuppa. There is no cost and buses and taxis are provided free of charge.

Volunteer Thank You

Each year the RSL hosts a volunteer thank you with the naming of the Volunteer of the Year. This is one of the few times during the year when all our volunteers get together. This years Volunteer of the Year was John Butler. John's passion for photography and unwavering dedication have captured the history of our community that will be cherished for generations.

Joint Venture

Due to a lack of numbers, Joint Venture have moved to the RSL. They play indoor bowls every Wednesday morning in one of the downstairs function rooms. A couple times a year they host other Clubs within the District. Joint Venture has operated under the Redlands RSL Sub Branch banner for over twenty years and is one of our ways to assist with social isolation.

100-year-old Veterans

The Sub Branch is privileged to have a number of members who have reached the wonderful age of 100 plus. When members reach their 100th they receive special recognition from State RSL. Usually this is presented to the veteran by the RSL Sub Branch President with a celebratory cake and morning tea. Our oldest member is Dennis who is 104.

Veteran and Wellbeing Excursions

This year saw 7 different excursions being offered to service members and their partners. Each excursion has sold out in record time and were enjoyed by all those that attended. Thank you must go to Greg Saunders for organising each of these wonderful trips.

136 AUSTRALIAN ARMY CADET UNIT – Annual Report 2025

136 Army Cadet Unit maintained a strong and consistent training tempo throughout 2025, centered on weekly parade nights that supported cadet progression through the Australian Army Cadets Development Continuum. These parade nights focused on core military skills, leadership development, and personal growth, ensuring cadets advanced at an appropriate pace. The unit conducted a number of promotions during the middle of 2025, with further promotions at the end of the year to prepare cadets for leadership roles in 2026. Cadets also participated in a Corporals Course, Adventurous Training, the Annual Field Exercise, Exercise Team Build, and Exercise Advance, with Exercise Advance attracting participation from members of other units and strengthening inter unit collaboration.

In addition to field training, 136 ACU maintained a strong ceremonial and community presence throughout the year. Cadets proudly represented the unit at key commemorative events including ANZAC Day, Vietnam Veterans Day, Remembrance Day, and the Tri Services Parade. The unit also supported community initiatives such as Legacy badge selling, reinforcing the values of service and remembrance. A significant cultural shift was implemented during 2025, with Senior Non Commissioned Officers given responsibility for planning and coordinating unit activities. This approach empowered senior cadets, enhanced leadership accountability, and resulted in more structured, cadet led training outcomes.

The Senior NCO driven training plan developed during 2025 has created a solid bedrock for the 2026 Senior Cadet Team, already setting in motion a stable and successful training year ahead. Command of the unit transitioned from CAPT Paul Golle to CAPT Craig Buckingham, ensuring continuity while introducing renewed focus on leadership development and unit sustainability. The Quartermaster's Department also commenced work on fitting out a new dedicated training space, to be known as the Grey Room, which will enhance instructional capability and is projected for completion in May 2026. SQNLDR (AAFC) Tony McKeaten was the Commanding Officer for 217SQN during 2025, and a key focus was on building the unit capability and onboarding recruits, recruiting new staff and implementing the new AAFC Cadet Program curriculum.

The AAFC Cadet Program is an experiential growth opportunity, focused on achieving the AAFC vision to offer the best youth program in Australia. The program changes have been designed to inspire young people to maximize their potential by emphasizing and cultivating the AAFC values of Service, Courage, Respect, Integrity, and Excellence.

In the first term of 2025, SQN members focused on learning new skills or extending existing skills, which enabled cadets to work toward participating in major activities. This included the SQN proudly participating in local ANZAC Day services, demonstrating the dedication of cadets in learning about and improving their dress, bearing, and drill competence. Additionally, the SQN in May joined with other local SQNs to participate in Exercise Endeavour, a weekend field activity designed to evaluate and expand fieldcraft skills.

Our cadets were also active in supporting the local community and were able to take time from their training to support local legacy fundraising activities, as well as at the Rotary Bookfest. The SQN has a number of Cadets working through the Duke of Edinburgh Award through the AAFC and these local community activities help the cadets learn the value of supporting the community as well as contributing towards their volunteer hours with the Duke of Edinburgh Award Scheme.



There are a number of 2 Wing activities that our cadets participate in as well to add value to the AAFC experience. This has included cadets having time to experience an air experience in small plane, whilst some others were able to undertake some pilot training. This year we also had two cadets working through the power aircraft training and one undertaking the gliding. On the fieldcraft side, we had two cadets participate as part of 2 Wing National fieldcraft teams.



In the second half of the year the SQN participated in another field exercise, Exercise Trailblazer with other SQNs in a less familiar field environment.

A tri-service annual parade was conducted with both army and navy cadet units, and it is an important event to encourage cross-service collaboration. Hopefully, in 2026, we will be able to expand our cross-service collaboration. Finally, the SQN held the Squadron Graduation Parade in December with the OC 2 Wing as the reviewing officer.

2025 has certainly been an eventful year, and 2026 will see the new CO PLTOFF (AAFC) Peter Eickenloff, march in, in mid-January 2026.

TS NORFOLK NAVY CADET UNIT – Annual Report 2025

'The use of the name TS Norfolk commemorates the exploration of Moreton Bay by Matthew Flinders in the year 1799 on HM Sloop "Norfolk". Lieutenant (later Captain) Matthew Flinders was the first explorer to enter Glass House Bay (now Moreton Bay). Having left Sydney on 8th July 1799 in HM Sloop Norfolk he reached Cape Moreton on 14th July. For two weeks he explored the bay and its environs. He entered Moreton Bay on 19th July 1799 landing at several places including Coochiemudlo Island. Travelling further south he noted what he thought was a wide, shallow river, this was in fact Redland Bay.'

'Training Ship Norfolk, is part of Australian Navy Cadets, Australia's premier youth development, organisation. Open to school-aged youth, who can join in the year that they turn 13 up to the year they turn 18. Cadets participate in activities such as powerboating, sailing, drone flying, robotics, sealift experience, international exchanges, national activities, Anzac Day and other ceremonial parades.'

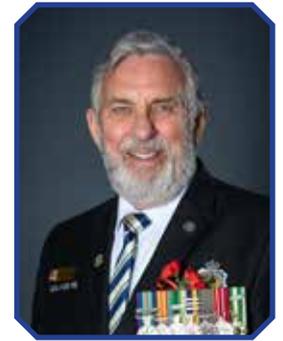

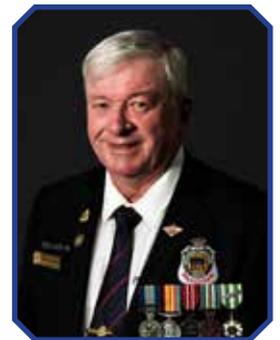

Note 1. Material accounting policy information

The Members of the Management Committee have prepared the financial statements on the basis that the Association is a non-reporting entity as there are no users dependent on a general purpose financial report. The financial report is therefore a special purpose financial report that has been prepared in order to meet the requirements of the *Associations Incorporation Act (QLD) 1981* and the *Australia Charities and Non-for-profits Commission Act 2012*.

New or amended Accounting Standards and Interpretations adopted

During the current year, the Association adopted all of the new and revised Australian Accounting Standards and Interpretations applicable to its operations which became mandatory.

Any new or amended Accounting Standards or Interpretations that are not yet mandatory have not been early adopted.

The adoption of these Standards has had no significant impact the financial statements of the Association.

Going concern

As at 31 December 2025 The Association had a net current asset deficiency of \$2,522,374 (2024: \$642,469) due to a bank loan scheduled for repayment (note 12). However, the financial statements have been prepared on a going concern basis as management believes the loan will be renegotiated successfully.

Should The Association be unable to continue as a going concern it may be required to realise its assets and extinguish its liabilities other than in the normal course of business and at amounts different to those stated in the financial statements. The financial statements do not include any adjustments relating to the recoverability and classification of asset carrying amounts or to the amount and classification of liabilities that might result should the entity be unable to continue as a going concern and meet its debts as and when they fall due.

Basis of preparation

These special purpose financial statements have been prepared on an accruals basis and are based on historical costs modified by the revaluation of selected non-current assets.

These financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the recognition and measurement requirements specified by the Australian Accounting Standards and Interpretations with the exceptions of:

- AASB 119 Employee Benefits to the extent described in Note 1, whereby, not all employees are included in the long service leave calculations and a probability analysis is not performed to determine whether employees will reach 10 years of service; and
- AASB 116 Property, plant and equipment due to a portion of freehold land and buildings being held at a historical valuation.

No other Accounting Standards, Accounting Interpretations of other authoritative pronouncements of the Australian Accounting Standards Board have been applied. The Association is a not-for-profit entity for financial reporting purposes under Australian Accounting Standards. This financial report covers Returned Services League of Australia (QLD Branch) Redlands Sub Branch Inc. as a single entity and has been prepared in Australian dollars and rounded to the nearest dollar.

The significant accounting policies disclosed below are those which the Members of the Management Committee have determined are appropriate to meet the needs of members. Such accounting policies are consistent with the previous period unless otherwise stated.

Historical cost convention

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention.

Critical accounting estimates

The preparation of the financial statements requires the use of certain critical accounting estimates. It also requires management to exercise its judgement in the process of applying the Association's accounting policies. The areas involving a higher degree of judgement or complexity, or areas where assumptions and estimates are significant to the financial statements, are disclosed in note 2.

Revenue recognition

The Association recognises revenue as follows:

To determine whether to recognise revenue, the Association follows a 5-step process:

- (1) Identifying the contract with a customer;
- (2) Identifying the performance obligations;
- (3) Determining the transaction price;
- (4) Allocating the transaction price to the performance obligations; and
- (5) Recognising revenue when/as performance obligation(s) are satisfied.

Revenue is recognised either at a point in time or over time, when (or as) the Association satisfies performance obligations by transferring the promised goods to its customers.

Revenue from sale of goods, such as food and liquor, is recognised at a point in time when control of the goods has passed to the buyer at an amount that reflects the consideration the Association expects to be entitled to in exchange for those goods. Control of goods are considered passed to the buyer at the time of the delivery of the goods to the customer.

Revenue from gaming machines is recognised on the basis of daily takings.

Revenue from membership subscriptions is recognised over the membership period.

Members' subscription payments received in advance are recognised as a contract liability on the statement of financial position. Other amounts received in advance of provision of goods or services are also included in contract liabilities, this includes grant revenue where received in advance.

Interest income is recognised as the interest accrues (using the effective interest rate method).

All revenue is net of goods and services tax (GST).

Income tax

The Redlands Sub Branch of the Returned Services League of Australia (QLD Branch) is a charity registered with the Australian Charities and Not-for-profit Commission ('ACNC'). As such, no income tax is payable for the year ended 31 December 2025, or is expected to be paid in subsequent years, so long the Association maintains its registration with the ACNC.

Current and non-current classification

Assets and liabilities are presented in the statement of financial position based on current and non-current classification.

An asset is classified as current when:

- It is either expected to be realised or intended to be sold or consumed in the Association's normal operating cycle;
- It is held primarily for the purpose of trading;
- It is expected to be realised within 12 months after the reporting period; or
- The asset is cash or cash equivalent unless restricted from being exchanged or used to settle a liability for at least 12 months after the reporting period.

All other assets are classified as non-current.

A liability is classified as current when:

- It is either expected to be settled in the Association's normal operating cycle;
- It is held primarily for the purpose of trading;
- It is due to be settled within 12 months after the reporting period; or
- There is no unconditional right to defer the settlement of the liability for at least 12 months after the reporting period.

All other liabilities are classified as non-current.

Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents includes cash on hand, deposits held at call with financial institutions, other short-term, highly liquid investments with original maturities of three months or less that are readily convertible to known amounts of cash and which are subject to an insignificant risk of changes in value.

Property, plant and equipment

Each class of property, plant and equipment is carried at cost or fair value less, where applicable, any accumulated depreciation and impairment losses.

Property

Freehold land and buildings are shown at either cost or historical valuation less, where applicable, any accumulated depreciation and impairment losses.

Increases in the carrying amount arising on revaluation of land and buildings are credited to a revaluation reserve in equity. Decreases that offset previous increases of the same class of asset are charged against the related revaluation reserve directly in equity; all other decreases are charged to the statement of profit or loss and other comprehensive income.

Any accumulated depreciation at the date of revaluation is eliminated against the gross carrying amount of the asset and the net amount is restated to the revalued amount of the asset.

The carrying amount of plant and equipment, including those held at the historical valuation, is reviewed annually by Members of the Management Committee to ensure it is not in excess of the recoverable amount from these assets. The recoverable amount is assessed on the basis of the expected net cash flows that will be received from the assets employment and subsequent disposal. The expected new cash flows have been discounted to their present values in determining recoverable amounts.

Plant and equipment that have been contributed at no cost, or for nominal cost, are valued and recognised at the fair value of the asset at the date it is acquired.

Depreciation

The depreciable amount of all fixed assets including buildings and capitalised leased assets, but excluding freehold land, is depreciated on a straight line basis over the asset's useful life to the Association commencing from the time the asset is held ready for use.

The depreciation rates used for each class of depreciable assets are:

<i>Class of asset</i>	<i>Expected useful life</i>
Buildings	20 - 60 years
Plant and equipment	2 - 20 years

The assets' residual values, depreciation methods and useful lives are reviewed, and adjusted if appropriate, at the end of each reporting period.

An asset's carrying amount is written down immediately to its recoverable amount if the asset's carrying amount is greater than its estimated recoverable amount.

An item of property, plant and equipment is derecognised upon disposal or when there is no future economic benefit to the Association. Gains and losses between the carrying amount and the disposal proceeds are taken to profit or loss. Any revaluation surplus reserve relating to the item disposed of is transferred directly to retained profits.

Gains and losses on disposals are determined by comparing proceeds with the carrying amount. These gains or losses are recognised immediately in profit or loss. When revalued assets are sold, amounts included in the revaluation surplus relating to that asset are transferred to retained earnings.

Right-of-use assets

A right-of-use asset is recognised at the commencement date of a lease. The right-of-use asset is measured at cost, which comprises the initial amount of the lease liability, adjusted for, as applicable, any lease payments made at or before the commencement date net of any lease incentives received, any initial direct costs incurred, and, except where included in the cost of inventories, an estimate of costs expected to be incurred for dismantling and removing the underlying asset, and restoring the site or asset.

Right-of-use assets are depreciated on a straight-line basis over the unexpired period of the lease or the estimated useful life of the asset, whichever is the shorter. Where the Association expects to obtain ownership of the leased asset at the end of the lease term, the depreciation is over its estimated useful life. Right-of-use assets are subject to impairment or adjusted for any remeasurement of lease liabilities.

Right-of-use assets that meet the definition of investment property are measured at fair value where the Association has adopted a fair value measurement basis for investment property assets.

Impairment of non-financial assets

At the end of each reporting year, Management reviews the carrying values of its tangible and intangible assets to determine whether there is any indication that those assets have been impaired. If such an indication exists, the recoverable amount of the asset, being the higher of the asset's fair value less costs to sell and value in use, is compared to the asset's carrying value. Value in use is either the discounted cash flows relating to the asset or depreciated replacement cost if the criteria in AASB 136 'Impairment of Assets' are met. Any excess of the asset's carrying value over its recoverable amount is recognised immediately in the profit or loss.

Where it is not possible to estimate the recoverable amount of an individual asset, Management estimates the recoverable amount of the cash generating unit to which the asset belongs.

Where the future economic benefits of the asset are not primarily dependent upon the asset's ability to generate net cash inflows and when the Association would, if deprived of the asset, replace its remaining future economic benefits, value in use is determined as the current replacement cost of an asset.

Assets, other than goodwill that have an allocated impairment loss are reviewed for reversal indicators at the end of each reporting period. After recognition of an impairment loss, the amortisation charge for the asset is adjusted in future periods to allocate the asset's revised carrying amount on a systematic basis over its remaining useful life.

Impairment losses are recognised as an expense immediately, unless the relevant asset is property, plant and equipment held at fair value (other than investment property carried at a revalued amount) in which case the impairment loss is treated as a revaluation decrease as described in the accounting policy for property, plant and equipment.

Trade and other payables

These amounts represent liabilities for goods and services provided to the Association prior to the end of the financial year and which are unpaid. Due to their short-term nature, they are measured at amortised cost and are not discounted. The amounts are unsecured and are usually paid within 30 days of recognition.

Contract liabilities

Contract liabilities represent the Association's obligation to transfer goods or services to a customer and are recognised when a customer pays consideration, or when the Association recognises a receivable to reflect its unconditional right to consideration (whichever is earlier) before the Association has transferred the goods or services to the customer.

Borrowings

Loans and borrowings are initially recognised at the fair value of the consideration received, net of transaction costs. They are subsequently measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method.

Lease liabilities

A lease liability is recognised at the commencement date of a lease. The lease liability is initially recognised at the present value of the lease payments to be made over the term of the lease, discounted using the interest rate implicit in the lease or, if that rate cannot be readily determined, the Association's incremental borrowing rate. Lease payments comprise of fixed payments less any lease incentives receivable, variable lease payments that depend on an index or a rate, amounts expected to be paid under residual value guarantees, exercise price of a purchase option when the exercise of the option is reasonably certain to occur, and any anticipated termination penalties. The variable lease payments that do not depend on an index or a rate are expensed in the period in which they are incurred.

Lease liabilities are measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method. The carrying amounts are remeasured if there is a change in the following:

- Future lease payments arising from a change in an index or a rate used;
- Residual guarantee;
- Lease term;
- Certainty of a purchase option; and
- Termination penalties.

When a lease liability is remeasured, an adjustment is made to the corresponding right-of use asset, or to profit or loss if the carrying amount of the right-of-use asset is fully written down. On the statement of financial position, lease liabilities have been included in trade and other payables.

League and wellbeing

This includes the costs related to organising commemorative events, wellbeing initiatives, support to various veteran and community groups, compensation/advocacy services and covering the operational expenses of RSL headquarters and library/museum.

Finance costs

Finance costs attributable to qualifying assets are capitalised as part of the asset. All other finance costs are expensed in the period in which they are incurred.

Provisions

Provisions are recognised when the Association has a legal or constructive obligation, as a result of past events, for which it is probable that an outflow of economic benefits will result and that outflow can be reliably measured.

Provisions are measured at the present value of Management's best estimate of the outflow required to settle the obligation at the end of the reporting period.

Employee benefits

Short-term employee benefits

Short-term employee benefits are benefits, other than termination benefits, that are expected to be settled wholly within twelve months after the end of the period in which the employees render the related service. Examples of such benefits include wages and salaries and non-monetary benefits.

Other long-term employee benefits

Provision is made for the Association's liability for employee benefits arising from services rendered by employees to the end of the reporting period where the employee has greater than 7 years of service. Employee benefits that are expected to be settled within one year have been measured at the amounts expected to be paid when the liability is settled. The probability of employees reaching the required service period is not factored into the calculation of the provision.

The Association presents employee benefit obligations as current liabilities in the statement of financial position if the Association does not have an unconditional right to defer settlement for at least 12 months after the reporting period, irrespective of when the actual settlement is expected to take place.

Fair value measurement

When an asset or liability, financial or non-financial, is measured at fair value for recognition or disclosure purposes, the fair value is based on the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date; and assumes that the transaction will take place either: in the principal market; or in the absence of a principal market, in the most advantageous market.

Fair value is measured using the assumptions that market participants would use when pricing the asset or liability, assuming they act in their economic best interests. For non-financial assets, the fair value measurement is based on its highest and best use. Valuation techniques that are appropriate in the circumstances and for which sufficient data are available to measure fair value, are used, maximising the use of relevant observable inputs and minimising the use of unobservable inputs.

Comparatives

Where necessary, comparative figures have been reclassified to conform with the changes in presentation in the current year.

Note 2. Critical accounting judgements, estimates and assumptions

Management evaluate estimates and judgments incorporated into the financial statements based on historical knowledge and best available current information. Estimates assume a reasonable expectation of future events and are based on current trends and economic data, obtained both externally and within the Association.

Estimation uncertainty

When preparing the financial statements, management undertakes a number of judgements, estimates and assumptions about recognition and measurement of assets, liabilities, income and expenses.

The actual results may differ from the judgements, estimates and assumptions made by management, and will seldom equal the estimated results.

Information about significant judgements, estimates and assumptions that have the most significant effect on recognition and measurement of assets, liabilities, income and expenses is provided below.

Useful lives of depreciable assets

Management reviews the useful lives of depreciable assets at each reporting date, based on the expected utility of the assets to the Association. Actual results, however, may vary due to technical obsolescence, particularly relating to software and IT equipment.

Carrying value of assets held at historical valuation

There are land and buildings that are carried at historical valuation less, where applicable, any accumulated depreciation and impairment losses. The critical assumptions adopted in determining the valuation included the location of the properties, the level of demand in the area and recent sales data for similar properties. As at 31 December 2025, the Management Committee has recorded the land and buildings held at historical valuation and are satisfied that its current carrying value does not exceed the recoverable amount.

Impairment of property, plant and equipment

The Association assesses impairment of property, plant and equipment at each reporting date by evaluating conditions specific to the Association and to the particular asset that may lead to impairment. If an impairment trigger exists, the recoverable amount of the asset is determined. This involves fair value less costs of disposal or value-in-use calculations, which incorporate a number of key estimates and assumptions.
