**GUEST SPEAKER:** Paul Oates – “Why Rome still Matters”

Paul Oates outlined how Ancient Rome continues to influence the modern world, noting the ongoing use of Roman numerals, Latin terminology, and Roman engineering and architecture. He highlighted parallels between ancient and modern mass entertainment, explained the army’s role in maintaining the Empire, and described how Roman roads and camps shaped later place names. He summarised key causes of Rome’s decline—political instability, over-expansion, economic strain, slavery, plagues, and external pressures—and noted that the fall of Constantinople in 1453 helped spark the Renaissance. He concluded by suggesting that Rome’s history offers lessons still relevant today.

He delivered a verbal update noting strong trading results: the bar was 10% above budget, bottle sales 15% above, restaurant 62% above, and Cove Café 87% above. Key figures reported were: members’ funds \$33.6M, current assets \$4.18M, current liabilities \$5.85M (including a \$3M loan), cash reserves \$1.36M, and operational funds \$1.78M. At the parade cadets learnt that the squadron had its first parade in the Redlands area as 17 Flight at the rear of the Redlands Cultural Centre on the 4th February 1989. In July 2001, following the Topely Report into the Australian Cadet Forces, the Air Training Corps became the Australian Air Force Cadets with Flights becoming Squadrons meaning 17 Flight became 217 Squadron.

After an eventful April and early May, the Squadron has now focused on field training and will join with 215SQN as well as some elements from both navy and army cadets for our first bivouac of the year at a local camping area. A different type of experience to help our cadets learn to work together while learning many fieldcraft skills. We look forward to reporting on their exploits in this regard next month.

# ASSISTANCE FOR VETERANS?

Redlands RSL Sub Branch is here to support veterans and their families, helping them find purpose, connection, and assistance whenever it is needed.

From time to time, veterans ask what the RSL can offer them if they become members of our Sub Branch. Every Sub Branch is different. Some have fewer than 20 members, while others have over 2,000. Each Sub Branch works within its available resources to support veterans and their families and to uphold the Objects of the League.

Located at RSL Headquarters, 1–11 Passage Street, Cleveland, the Redlands RSL Sub Branch provides a range of services and activities, including:

**Advocacy** - Free assistance from qualified ADTP Advocates with DVA claims and appeals.

**Commemorative Services** - Support and participation in Anzac Day, Vietnam Veterans Day, Remembrance Day, Honouring the Fallen, and AWAMO Remembrance services.

**Poppy Service** - For a deceased veteran, provided at the request of the next of kin.

**Wellbeing Support Officers** - Home visits, transport assistance (where not covered by DVA entitlements), and referrals to appropriate support agencies.

**Social Connection** -

- **Golden Oldies** – every second Tuesday, free of charge for those over 80.
- **Veterans Cuppa** – on the second Wednesday of each month.
- **Bus Excursions** – approximately every six weeks at reasonable cost.

**Member Involvement** - Monthly meetings where members can contribute to decisions affecting the Sub Branch followed by camaraderie.

**Practical Assistance** - Gardening assistance for eligible veterans.

**Communication** - Monthly Bugle newsletter, Redlands RSL website, Facebook updates, and information displayed at the RSL.

**Community Engagement** -

- Collaboration with other ex-service organisations (contact details available in the Bugle and on RSL TV screens).
- **Joint Venture** Indoor Bowls held weekly in the Tobruk Room at the RSL.

# History

MAY

DATE	TITLE	EVENT
4 May 1942	Battle of Coral Sea begins	This was the first naval engagement fought by aircraft alone. Although neither side won a clear victory, the Japanese were forced to attempt to capture Port Moresby in a ground campaign, rather than by sea as they had hoped.
8 May 1970	Anti-war demonstrations in Australia	Up to 200,000 Australians participate in demonstrations against the Vietnam War.
13 May 1968	Fire Support Base Coral attacked	The partly-constructed base, north of Saigon, was defended by Australian infantry, artillery, and air support when it was attacked by North Vietnamese troops. Eleven Australians were killed and 28 wounded before the attackers were driven back. Fifty-two enemy soldiers were killed and one was taken prisoner.
14 May 1943	Centaur sunk	The hospital ship Centaur was sunk by a Japanese submarine off the south Queensland coast. Only 64 of the 333 on board survived.
15 May 1942	Prisoners of Japanese transported to begin work on Burma–Thailand Railway	Movement of prisoners of war (A Force) to Thailand from Singapore begins for work on the Burma–Thailand Railway.
19 May 1915	Turkish counter-attack on Gallipoli	The Turkish counter-attack sought to drive the Australians and New Zealanders from Anzac Cove. The attack failed and over 10,000 Turks were killed or wounded in their greatest disaster of the entire campaign.
20 May 1941	Germans invade Crete	German airborne forces begin their invasion of Crete on 20 May. Though outnumbered by Allied troops, they were better equipped and better organised. After less than two weeks of fighting allied troops began to evacuate the island.
21 May 1968	HMAS Sydney leaves Brisbane	HMAS Sydney leaves Brisbane on its tenth voyage to Vietnam with 4th Battalion, Royal Australian Regiment, embarked.
27 May 1965	HMAS Sydney's first voyage to Vietnam	HMAS Sydney departs on first voyage to Vietnam with 1st Battalion, Royal Australian Regiment, embarked.
31 May 1902	Boer War ends	Boers surrender, ending the Boer War. Over 16,000 Australians served in South Africa, of whom nearly 600 died.
